Friends of Lesotho continues to rely on your generous donations to continue to

support projects in Lesotho. The Board recently approved three grants:

- \$4,000 to support PCV projects and provide tuition to Basotho students (administered through the Peace Corps Partnership Program)
- A \$700 donation for the Laptops to Lesotho project, led by RPCV Janissa Balcomb
- \$3,000 for a project led by FOL Board Member Scott Rosenberg, which will support the construction of two Habitat for Humanity houses to be built for orphan-headed households in Nazareth and contribute to the building of an orphanage/dormitory in Motsekuoa

Lesotho I Reunion

In Sesotho, it's *poli ea soalala*. The American translation of this is "planning the first Lesotho I Reunion." No matter what the language, putting together a meeting of Peace Corps Volunteers 40 years after service is, indeed, like herding scattered goats.

On Memorial Day weekend of 2010, an intense year of planning, monthly conference calls, and email blizzards among planning committee members culminated in a once-in-a-lifetime reunion of 37 of the original Lesotho I volunteers, who served in Lesotho from 1967 to 1969. Also attending were spouses, staff members, friends, and volunteers who were in Lesotho at the same time. The meeting site was at the venerable Omni Shoreham Hotel in, appropriately, Washington, D.C.

The greatest challenge of the reunion was learning the whereabouts of the Lesotho I RPCVs after so many years. Thanks to a dynamic and relentless research crew and contributions from many resources, an unbelievable 80 members out of the original 83 were accounted for. Also included in the planning and organization was the establishment of a Facebook site to share photos and memories, reunion name tags in the shape of Basotho hats manufactured by one of the RPCVs, a biographical book that included the volunteer profiles published 42 years earlier along with updated information and photos, an exhibit wall/tables of news clippings and mementoes of the Lesotho I Peace Corps experience, and table centerpieces with the three Lesotho national flags that have flown over the country.

And, in the spirit of volunteerism, RPCVs couldn't just get together to

count gray hairs. We turned to an inspiring roster of speakers to update us on today's Peace Corps, modern Lesotho, and what might be a helpful project for the members of Lesotho I to undertake. Among those speakers were:

- His Excellency David Mohlomi Rantekoa, ambassador of the Kingdom of Lesotho to the United States;
- Aaron Williams, the Director of the Peace Corps;
- Kevin Quigley of the National Peace Corps Office;
- Fernando Moyle from the Lesotho desk of Peace Corps; and
- Friends of Lesotho representative John Hollister.

Williams started out festivities on Friday evening with a glimpse into the modern Peace Corps. Following that, the in-country director for Lesotho I, David Sherwood, started the RPCVs galloping down memory lane by telling us of the behind-the-scenes drama that ensued when we were the first U.S. governmental body since the U.S. Cavalry to be officially issued horses. The session was theoretically suggested to be a time to share how being in the Peace Corps had changed our lives, but it took many turns before it disbanded in the wee hours of Saturday morning.

Saturday included informal visiting, a session with Quigley and Moyle on volunteer activity in today's Lesotho, chatting via

electronic media with volunteers who could not attend the reunion in person, and a tour of the White House arranged by the son of one of the RPCVs. Saturday evening, Ambassador Rantekoa not only honored the group with a presentation on modern Lesotho, but patiently posed with the group for an official reunion photo.

Before closing down the party Sunday, John Hollister spoke on how FOL operated and how FOL could participate in projects determined by the Lesotho I group. The RPCVs discussed several suggestions and opted for establishing a fund to provide mini-grants to in-country volunteers to be used for whatever need the volunteer chose.

At the close of the weekend, Lesotho I RPCVs parted, wondering why we hadn't done this years ago and pondering whether, now that members had been located, it might not be easier next time.

Village Hope

Village Hope Project has continued assisting orphans since it began in 2006. Each year, we return to Ha Molapo, in the Butha-Buthe district, to assist a group of children who have been living on their own or with unsatisfactory caretakers. We use the funds raised to pay any school fees that are due and to buy school uniforms, clothing, food, and household supplies to last until our next visit. Our returning representative this year was Sethunya Gall, an orphan found living on his own and adopted by PCV Georgann Gall in 2006. At 18 years old, he was able to return to his village from where he is now living in Long Beach, California, and purchase the necessary supplies for the kids. Sethunya, who is attending college in Long Beach, has the goal of returning to Lesotho to become a school principal. Anyone interested in donating to Village Hope Project may simply send their donation to Friends of Lesotho, noting that it is for Village Hope. This will allow us to continue to assist the orphans of Ha Molapo.



Contribute to History

Peace Corps has announced that they are working with the Smithsonian Institution's National Museum of American History to conduct an artifact search in the hopes of creating a permanent Peace Corps collection at the museum. This is a chance to have artifacts from RPCVs become part of this national institution and to help people better understand the Peace Corps. The focus is on the volunteer rather than the country in which they served.

But the most significant difference — there's no longer the deep, prolonged sense of isolation from family and friends. Distance is almost irrelevant. Deepest, darkest Africa is just an instant text message away. Fortunately, the taxi rides still provide an adventure.

GPS Tracks Roof of Africa Leaders

This year, organizers of the Roof of Africa dirt-bike race are using GPS to track the race leaders. Fluxcon, a satellite tracking service provider based in Pretoria, is having tracking units mounted on the bikes of the top 10 competitors. To date, it has been difficult to track the riders over the rough terrain, but GPS may provide the answer. This method of tracking improves participant safety and enables fans to follow the race. In addition to GPS tracking, all riders will wear arm bands with electronic devices that will be swiped at various checkpoints. This enables race officials to track participants' progress and ensure that they have reached checkpoints.

United Arab Emirates Ambassador to South Africa Ismail Obeid Al Ali recently attended a reception hosted by King Letsie III of Lesotho and discussed potential joint cooperation with the ministers of foreign affairs and international cooperation, agriculture, finance, and tourism, as well as the chancellor of the University of Lesotho. During his time in Lesotho, the ambassador also met with World Bank representatives and a number of businessmen and investors to explore prospects of trade and economic cooperation.

Government Moves to Close Unregistered Schools

For a school to be registered under the Education Act 2010, it must have a board of directors and a constitution approved by the Ministry of Education. The school must also show proof of title to the land on which it is located, and the buildings and facilities must meet the government's standards. Also, the school must show its financial position at the time of registration and proof that it has money to sustain itself. The government recently took steps to notify unregistered schools that they will be shut down. Many of these schools are operating from run-down structures and have no proper

bathrooms. A number are also operating without qualified teachers. The Lesotho Teachers' Trade Union (LTTU) spokesperson, Vuyani Tyhali, said the unregistered schools deserve to be closed because they are "spoiling the education sector." "Some schools open today and close overnight because they are not formally registered and nobody is accountable for their wrongdoing," Tyhali said. "They open with the sole purpose of enriching their proprietors and they charge exorbitant fees. By so doing, they are defrauding the nation."

Unrest at Limkokwing University of Creative Technology

In October of 2008, Limkokwing University of Creative Technology opened a campus in Lesotho. The new campus, which was launched by Prime Minister Pakalitha Mosisili, marked the first entry of a Malaysian university into Lesotho and the establishment of Limkokwing's second campus in Africa (the other is in Botswana). Recently, however, the campus has seen unrest as the students protested the dismissal of the Students' Representative Council president and demanded the dismissal of four administrators.
