The Friends of Lesotho (FOL) is halfway into our 2012 program year and making progress on several initiatives established as goals in our operating plan for the year. The success in reaching our goals is due to the planning efforts made by committee chairs and the recruitment of committee members from the general membership.

We recognize that without membership participation on committees and task forces, we would not be able to accomplish the goals established in our 2012 Operating Plan.

The FOL Board operates by division of work processes through the use of committees, task forces, and representatives to associated organizations such as the National Peace Corps Association (NPCA) and the embassies in Washington D.C. and Maseru. ### A Hopeful Place in a Troubled Land

In 2003, my wife Pam and I arrived in Lesotho to serve as Peace Corps Volunteers at Maluti Adventist Hospital in Mapoteng (Berea District). It wasn't long before we became friends with M'e Mamello Lehlotha a young Masotho who had recently graduated from secretarial school in Maseru and taken a job at the hospital. She was grateful for her good job, but as we soon learned she was hoping for the day when she could return to her village of Pitseng to work on behalf of people with disabilities.

Mamello had TB of the bone as a child and still walked with a limp. Consequently, she had also known the painful reality of the discrimination that is so common against people with special needs, and the expectations that are placed upon family and the entire village to keep such people out of sight. And yet Mamello's mother had chosen to defy the tradition and do her best to give Mamello the opportunities that would be denied to so many others.

And so it was that Mamello soon returned to her village to do for others what her mother had done for her: creating opportunities for people with special needs to take their rightful place within the community. It was during the next couple of years that it was Pam's and my privilege to visit Mamello's village and watch admiringly as her dream unfolded



First, a woman chief understood Mamello's vision and provided a rondavel where people with special needs could meet and make their plans. Next came the fields as a gift from the chief, the land that was needed for planting the gardens that would provide the produce to be sold at the market. One thing just seemed to follow another, until eventually this little group of "disabled" people had gained such a voice they could not be ignored and resources were found to build the community of Phelisanong for children, including orphans, and adults with "special needs". Today this little village includes schools, dormitories, a medical clinic, and training programs, with a focus on overcoming HIV/AIDS.

In the early stages of this fascinating work, the Peace Corps assigned two volunteers to Phelisanong, and not long after, the Canadian NGO, The Glasswater Foundation, agreed to provide some funding. However, more significant than the finances was the fact that the directors of Glasswater, Gary McNutt and Andrea Palframan, made the decision to bring their school aged children with them and make Phelisanong their home for six months of every year.



During one of Pam's and my last visits to Phelisanong, we had the opportunity to reminisce with Mamello about those days at the hospital when she shared with us her desire to return to her village to work on behalf of those with special needs, to do what she believed God wanted her to do. "Now look at all this," she said. "In the past no one expected anything of people with special needs. But today people are coming from around the world to see what they can learn."

At this time Friends of Lesotho is contributing to the Post-Secondary Education Scholarship Fund so that some of the "graduates" of Phelisanong can receive the education that allows them to take their rightful place as leaders in Lesotho. For more information go to www.phelisanong.org.



### YOUR Donations at Work

The FOL Donations/Distribution Committee recently recommended (and the Board approved) over \$25,000 to support several on-going projects as well as one new special scholarship initiative in Lesotho.

### Special Needs Youth Get Helping Hand

Phelisanong Scholarship Fund is slated to receive \$2,000 this month. This special scholarship fund request came to our attention through Dick Nystrom, 2003-2005 RPCV and FOL Board member. Phelisanong supports disabled and other special needs students in Pitseng. These are students not supported by the Tuition Assitance Program (TAP) due to the fact that no PCV is currently assigned to the school. For more details, see Dick's article on page 2.

#### Tapping into Solar in Lesotho

Laptops to Lesotho will be even more energized with FOL's donation of \$3,863 which will be used to purchase solar panels, batteries and a regulator and inverter. ### 25% Increase in TAP Scholarship Requests

The TAP (Tuition Assistance Program) PCV Committee Chair, Lauren Parks, provided FOL with an estimate of \$20,000 to fund this year's scholarships for needy secondary students. This is an increase of \$4,000 from last year's program that provided partial scholarships for 161 students. In 2011, 21 PCVs took advantage of the TAP funds. This year 29 PCVs have submitted applications for TAP scholarship support. The FOL Board has approved an amount up to \$25,000 for this year, pending receipt of the final dollar amount needed.

### Little Angels Orphan Day Care and Pre-School

At the end of 2010 FOL entered into a 2-year agreement to support Little Angels which employs pre-school teachers (R1800/month) and provides 2 meals a day (avg. R4000/mo.) for approximately 45 orphans in Thaba Bosiu. Rose Paradise worked with the local village chief and other Basotho at the end of her PC service in 2005 to get this program off the ground and has remained in Lesotho since.

A total of \$4,580 was provided to Little Angels in 2011 combining contributions from FOL, Bloom Africa (www.bloomafrica.org) and the Ohio Rotary. FOL sent \$2,885 for the first 6 months of 2012 and will be making its second contribution this month, per the MOU established in 2010. However, Little Angels operating expenses have increased in 2012, due in part to rising food costs combined with medical expenses for some of the HIV positive orphans. So, if you have a little extra in your budget this month, please send it to FOL for the benefit of Little Angels. As little as \$12/month will feed one of the 45 orphans cared for at Little Angels. #### CafePress Alternatives.

The fundraising committee has been looking at CafePress and can use your input. Take a look at these options and let us know if you have alternative sites that you may think would provide better items and yield more in revenue to FOL. If the suggested new site requires graphic skills please advise if you are able to provide them or know an FOL member who can. For the time being we will keep the present store as it gives the most choices for Lesotho oriented products.

The FOL Board wanted to investigate alternatives to the FOL "store" at CafePress. This is due to the low yield to FOL from the store as well as the departure of Janissa Balcomb who created and managed it. Are there other ways to sell Lesotho oriented products that are more profitable to FOL?

#### **Summary and Options:**

- FOL's CafePress store (http://www.cafepress.com/lesotho) has customizable items tailored to Lesotho RPCVs and their friends and family. FOL members can maintain a "contact" with Lesotho oriented products and make purchases that benefit them and send some funds to FOL.
- Its operation has been based on the effort and graphical skills of Janissa Balcomb. Such attention and skills would be needed for FOL to set up a similar store.
- Store alternatives were researched. None appear to be any better than CafePress. Any replacement would require new graphics design development.
- FOL could decide on selling one, two or a few items and order them quantity. Take membership and friend orders for them.

As a fundraiser, the CafePress store does not yield a lot - \$136 last year.

- Option 1. Keep the existing store. We want to be able to provide FOL members with a way to purchase Lesotho oriented items. If we do nothing and keep the store, there will be an availability of Lesotho oriented items with little additional effort needed. If we want to change CafePress items, we would need to find an FOL member with graphical skills; and, who is willing to operate the store.
- Option2. Ask the membership if they are aware of any online storefronts that sell tailor made products they are of better quality than CafePress. Investigate those stores and see if they are better both in quality and revenue potential for FOL. Several stores were investigated that do not appear likely to be better in quality or revenue. A new graphical design scheme would need to be developed to fit the store's requirements
- Option 3. Consider our own mail order store: An FOL member would hold the inventory and send the membership a request for orders of items like T-shirts or mugs. Develop a profit goal. Buy the items in bulk and sell to reach that goal.

### Connections

I have a story of a PCV who became a very good friend of my wife and I, starting in 1968 at Thabana Morena, Mafeteng. I think Ian arrived at Thabana Morena High School late in 1967. The trading store at Thabana Morena, just down the road from the high school, belonged to my family, and my wife and I arrived there in February 1968.

Ian and I had a rocky start to our friendship, since he was thought I was South African, which I am not, having been born in Basutoland in 1934. My mother was born at Sebapala in 1898, and my dad arrived in Basutoland in the late 1917/18 at the end of the First World War.

Having proved my Lesotho citizenship to both Ian and the Peace Corps office, Ian was allowed to visit our home at the store. We had a baby boy and Ian loved our child and spent a lot of his free time with us. We remember the winter of 1968 as a turning point in our friendly relationship. Ian lived at the high school which had no hot running water. By about mid July Ian had a well-developed, unwashed smell about him since deodorants were not too freely available in country stores at that time. One afternoon he was playing with our baby boy who suddenly pushed him away and would not let him near again. We obviously understood why our son was doing that, so my wife reluctantly asked Ian if he would like a hot bath. He jumped at the chance and that was the start of a very long relationship.

When Ian's service was up, he returned to the states and joined the Airforce. He was sent to Germany where he studied medicine, eventually married and went home again. We were in touch most of that time. I believe that all of Ian and Therisa's three kids, got Basuto LiLala blankets for their 1<sup>st</sup> birthdays from Thabana Morena.

Twenty odd years later we got an email from Ian telling us that he was coming to Durban for a Medical Conference. He came and stayed with us and we spent a very happy month reliving our experiences. Therisa had many stories about Ian from when they first met. One was how Ian would walk into a room full of strangers and insist on shaking each one by the hand, which he said was just good manners that he had learned in Lesotho.


As a result of our family's relationship with Ian while he was in Lesotho, our home has been a place of welcome to many PCVs. For instance, when our son, Jonathan Halse, took over the Lodge at Semonkong in about 1990, almost every Thanksgiving was celebrated with the PCVs at the Lodge.

My entire family has very happy memories of the volunteers who became our friendsWe also have found PCV's as we travelled all over Africa. Once, hopelessly lost in Dar Es Salaam, the only European we saw was a young female Peace Corp volunteer who, when we approached her for help, sent us off in the right direction.

I believe that Peace Corps volunteers have been very, very good for Lesotho. Our good friend Ian Duncan is a prime example.

#### **Audio Streams of Africa News:**

The following are links you can use to listen to BBC's Africa Service. This will likely work without the need to download any additional software, unless you have a really, really, old computer.

BBC's evening News show, "Focus on Africa". You'll remember this by the "Trumpets of Doom" intro http://www.bbc.co.uk/worldservice/africa/2011/04/00000\_focus\_on\_africa.shtml

BBC's morning show, "Network Africa". This show is a more lighthearted than the "Focus on Africa" fair and may include music and culture. http://www.bbc.co.uk/worldservice/africa/2011/04/00000\_network\_africa.shtml

#### **Podcasts:**

If you are not familiar with these, you can think of Podcasts as radio programs that you download to a computer and listen to on your own schedule. Many of these are recorded from actual radio programs, but others are simply released as Podcasts.

In order to enjoy Podcasts, you do not need to go out and buy yourself an Apple iPod. You do however need to have a PC or Mac computer.

Download and install the free iTunes software: http://www.apple.com/itunes/

From within iTunes, click on "iTunes Store" on the left side and then in the search box at the top right, enter a subject or program name on which to search for matches. This will likely yield a long list of 'hits', many of which Apple will be happy to sell you. For the free Podcasts, just click on the "Podcasts" link on the left under the "Filter By Media Type". When you find what you want, click on the "Subscribe" button and the latest broadcast should download to you computer.

#### **Lesotho Prime Minister Resigns**

The breaking news out of Lesotho is that Prime Minister Dr. Pakalitha Mosisili resigned on Wednesday, May 30, after his party, the Democratic Congress, failed to win a majority in parliament following the May 26 general election. The Democratic Congress won more parliamentary seats than any other party, but not enough to take power on its own. On the Tuesday following the elections, the leader of the All Basotho Convention (ABC), Tom Thabane, announced that a number of opposition parties had negotiated a new coalition government. The alliance has a majority of 64 seats in the 120-seat parliament and Mr. Thabane is expected to be installed Lesotho's next Prime Minister.

The Maseru City Council (MCC) is developing a Central Park in the Central Business District which incorporates a parking garage designed to regulate parking in the city and generate revenue. The MCC also plans to assume management of parking areas by the Victoria Hotel, Lancers Inn and Hopolang building. The revenue raised from parking fees will be used to maintain the parking garages and street lighting.
