President's Letter

Lumelang Metsoalle,

First, I wanted like to thank our members who continue to support our work and the board members for all the hours they have put in. I am pleased to report that FOL continues to fulfill its mission to promote positive change and to assist the people of Lesotho.

This month FOL launched a Back to School: Education Assistance for Basotho Youth fundraiser, as of writing this letter over \$2,000 had been raised. The funds raised will help pay for scholarships, school supplies, and projects to improve the quality of education at various schools in Lesotho. Thanks to the generous support from the American School in Taipei, FOL was able to provide \$10,400 worth of TAP scholarships. This will allow 45 deserving Basotho youth to attend high school this year. The scholarship money was requested by 17 volunteers across 9 districts in Lesotho.

On a personal note, with assistance from FOL, my students were able during our June trip to Lesotho to: build one house, one greenhouse, 2 playgrounds, 2 gardens, and plant over 100 fruit trees. We were also able to paint 2 classrooms in Ramabanta and a dining hall at an orphanage in Mafeteng. We were also able to prepare over 100 meals for children suffering from malnutrition and stunting in Ramabanta. The 142,000 meals containing nutritional supplements packed by the Lesotho Nutrition Initiative, shipped at the end of May with support from FOL, arrived in Lesotho in early July. The meals will help over 1,500 children at seven different centers from Mokhotlong to Mohale's Hoek. While in Lesotho my students and I were invited to the Royal Palace and we had the pleasure of spending a hour with his Majesty, King Letsie III. I would like to share with FOL members how incredibly gracious I found his excellency to be. He was very appreciative of the efforts of groups such as FOL to help the Basotho. It is a day that I will never forget.

I am pleased to report that our new free membership policy has led to an increase in FOL members, and especially an increase in the number of Basotho living in Lesotho who have joined. Lastly, I would like to thank Stacey McKeever for her work on the crowdfunding campaign, and on a sadder note I would like to thank Courtney McDermott for her hard work on the newsletter and how much her dedication will be missed. Education Assistance for Lesotho's Youth (continued from page 1)

In Lesotho, participation in primary school is free and almost universal, and 92% of boys and 95% of girls attend. However, secondary school fees are not covered by the government and attendance drops off. Only 51% of girls and 35% of boys attend secondary school and only 10% of Basotho men and women have completed secondary school.

The school fees, books and exam costs--which can cost over \$200 a year--are beyond the reach of many in a nation where over half live below the international poverty line (\$1.90 per day).

Since 1992, Friends of Lesotho have been providing scholarships and tuition assistance to needy students in Lesotho. This year we are embarking on our first ever crowdfunding campaign to increase our ability to support students in Lesotho.

As we head back to school ourselves this fall, let's help students in Lesotho build a better future for themselves and their country. As little as \$25 can pay school fees for three months for a secondary student, \$100 will send a child to school for a year, and \$200 will cover books, exam fees, and transportation for a year.

RPCVs Corinne and Colin Hoag sponsored Kabelo's secondary education, and it made all the difference. Corinne says, "As a PCV, I met Kabelo when he was about 13 and living with the family next door to me. Both of his parents had died when he was young and in exchange for his room and board, he cared for this family's cattle. He would visit me regularly for tutoring help with English and math and I could see he enjoyed school. Once he was ready to begin secondary school, it became clear that the family he stayed with could not afford to pay his school fees. Without further education or a family for support, his only real path was to quit school and care for this family's cattle.

We decided to support him through secondary school because he deserved more education and the opportunities that might come from that. He performed well in school and enjoyed learning, especially science. He also played football and continued to help care for the cattle at his home. At the end of secondary school, he saw that there were other opportunities in the world for him. He applied to a vocational college and was accepted into a program to

learn computer science. He was awarded a partial scholarship and we contributed additional money to make up the difference.

Last year, he completed his AA degree in computer science from a vocational school in Maseru. He now lives in Maseru and has a computer programming job with a small company there. He is able to support himself now, living in the capital, which is more than I would have the supply a special part of the started halving. I'm really proved of him to

thought possible when we first started helping. I'm really proud of him for his accomplishments."

When asked about this experience, Kabelo wrote that "this has been a really help for me. I would very much thank everybody who gave their money on somebody whom they did not even see his potential. Thanks a lot!"



Lesotho Defence Force Commander Killed

Lesotho Defence Force Commander Khoantle Paul Motšomotšo was killed on Tuesday, 5 September, in his Maseru office. His assailants have been identified as two of Motšomotšo's high-ranking colleagues, Tefo Hashatsi and Bulane Sechele. Both Hashatsi and Sechele were killed by Motšomotšo's bodyguards moments later. A career soldier, Motšomotšo served nearly four decades in the LDF, reaching the rank of Lieutenant General. He is survived by his wife and five children.

Motšomotšo's murder is the latest in the ongoing political crisis in Lesotho, dating to (at least) January 2014, when the homes of both the Lesotho Mounted Police Service commander and Prime Minister Thabane's then-girlfriend were bombed. Suspicion over those bombings centered on Sechele and Hashatsi, as well as former LDF commander Tlali Kamoli. That trio has also been implicated in the attempted coup of August 2014 that led Thabane to flee the country, as well as the killing of former LDF commander Maaparankoe Mahao.

Remarkably, the Lesotho Times reports that Sechele and Hashatsi confronted Motšomotšo about his failure to protect them from police investigation into another killing, that of Lisebo Tang, an unarmed civilian, in 2014.

Security forces and politicians are often intertwined in Lesotho. Kamoli, Hashatsi, and Sechele are no exception; they are deeply aligned with Lesotho Congress for Democracy leader and former Deputy Prime Minister Mothetjoa Metsing. Metsing fled to South Africa in late August, claiming that he feared for his well-being. His fears are not unjustified; Tšeliso Mokhosi, the deputy LCD leader, was arrested for his alleged role in yet another murder, that of Mokhotlong police constable Mokalekale Khetheng. Mokhosi claims that he was tortured by LMPS officers while in custody.

SADC has sent an undisclosed number of troops into the Mountain Kingdom, and RSA Deputy President Cyril Ramaphosa will continue in his role as negotiator.

Security forces are deeply politicized in Lesotho, and further reforms are needed to separate politicians and the political process from soldiers. Without substantive reforms, it is hard to imagine the recent years of violence ending.

Electronic Visa Program

Lesotho now has a top-tier electronic visa program, joining only 13 other countries on the continent, according to the African Development Bank's Visa Openness Index. Launched on May 5, the platform was created by the Lesotho government in partnership with a U.S.-based, privately owned IT company, Computer Frontiers.
