LESOTHO: FURTHER TOWARD THE ABYSS

here had been a fatal incident in the Maseru Police office in October 1995 (I was unable to find any reference to this incident in recent prior issues of FOL). Three (3) police officers had been killed and several others had been injured.

A Commission had been formed to investigate this incident (apparently, however, it was a commission of one) and in November 1996 the Prime Minister presented to Parliament a summary of the Commission's report. The report implicated eight (8) police officers in the October 1995 incident. The Mirror reported in the 22 January 1997 issue that the government had unsuccessfully tried to arrest these eight (8) officers earlier in the month. Two (2) weeks after this unsuccessful attempt, the implicated officers and the office of the Commissioner of Police held a meeting. The police officers already had the support of a squad from the Police Training Collage (PTC) and this squadron appeared at the meeting very heavily armed. Regardless, the Commissioner's representative and the implicated officers both briefed members of various political parties, non-governmental organizations and church leaders about the deaths and the conclusions drawn by the commission of inquiry. The spokesman for the implicated officers was Second Lieutenant Phakiso Molise, who also appears to be the lead conspirator.

Very little appears to have been achieved at this meeting. Second Lieutenant Molise insisted he and his alleged co-conspirators were innocent and that some unnamed "top" police officials actu-

ally know who killed the three (3) officers in 1995 but were withholding that information.

The entire situation became much more perilous when the implicated officers and their supporters (the actual number of supporters is unclear — the 26 February issue of

any strange events have occurred in Lesotho since the previous issue of FOL (actually it seems many strange events occur in Lesotho between each issue of FOL) but the events described in this issue are obviously attributable to Hale-Bopp.

A part of the police force took over the Police Headquarters building and apparently forced the resignation of the Deputy Commissioner of Police and several of his subordinates (the Commissioner himself was in Botswana at the time). There was a great deal of turmoil in the police department and eventually, this lead to a strike and most police duties being taken over by the defence forces (more on this later).

There was a great deal of confusion surrounding the leadership of the Basotho Congress Party (BCP) (see the Winter 1997, Summer 1996, Fall 1995, etc., etc., etc., etc. — apparently see all past issues of FOL — this seems to be a recurring theme of the BCP).

Bill Dunn, our Membership Database guru has been kind enough

to provide me with several different graphs concerning our membership. I will include at least one of the graphs in the next several issues of FOL for informational purposes.

You will have to excuse the delay in getting this issue of FOL out, but I had to do my taxes at some point. Unfortunately, the deadlines for filing and FOL were just about concurrent and the IRS won.

LESOTHO VETERINARIAN HOPES TO ATTEND IOWA STATE

There is a veterinarian from LESOTHO attending a summer course at Iowa State University Veterinary College. She is an expert in poultry medicine. This course is put together by the Institute for International Cooperation in Animal Biologics. The information our Lesotho veterinarian will receive will help the Egg Circle in Lesotho as well as the poultry meat industry. The institute charges quite a fee for veterinarians, regulatory officials and other animal husbandry people to attend. They do reserve some grant money to sponsor individuals from developing countries. Here is

The Mirror indicates 30 supporters but the 5 March issue indicates there were only 13) took over the Maseru Police Headquarters building. The mutineers forced all senior personnel in the building to write letters of resignation and to leave immediately. The Commissioner of Police, Major-General Makoaba, was not in Lesotho when this event occurred and the mutineers, therefore, named one of their members, Colonel Mokhohlane, as the new Commissioner.

Major-General Makoaba, upon his return to Lesotho, declared he was still the Commissioner of Police and demanded the senior personnel who had been forced to write letters of resignation and leave Police headquarters return to work. Major-General Makoaba then closed the Police Training College (interestingly, the Commissioner actually still did not have site control of either the PTC nor Police Headquarters at this point).

The Mirror reported in the 5
February issue that the eight (8)
accused officers petitioned the High
Court to have the charges against
them declared null and void (officially, as reported in the 29 January
issue, as two (2) counts of murder,
three (3) counts of attempted murder
and one (1) count of kidnapping there was no explanation why the
third murder count was dropped).
Their petition was denied.

This turn in events led the entire police force to then suspend operations and effectively stage a strike. The government then transferred police duties to the Defence Forces and set about planning the operation to regain control of the PTC and Police Headquarters.

The army began the operation early in the morning of 16 February and finished by early afternoon. However, none of the eight (8) indited officers were in Police Head-

quarters when the army regained control. It seems (from the 26 February issue of The Mirror) that Second Lieutenant Molise, the lead alleged co-conspirator and 30 followers had either found sanctuary in or had invaded the Royal Palace, depending upon which side you believe. The government of Prime Minister Mokhehle's position, delivered by his deputy, Pakalitha Mosisili, is the King was hiding Second Lieutenant Molisi and his followers in the Palace during the 16 February operation. The Palace vigorously denied that allegation and insisted these heavily armed police invaded the palace to seek the support of the King in any negotiations to turn themselves over to the authorities.

Regardless of which version you believe, the army did search the Palace for Molisi and his followers. The King did, at some point during these proceedings, it is not exactly clear when, personally inform the commander of the Defence Forces that some of the police officers had taken refuge in the Palace. The King then summoned the Prime Minister to receive a personal assurance that alleged mutineers would not be tortured. The Prime Minister provided this assurance and the officers were disarmed and subsequently arrested.

There were not any later issues of The Mirror received so the fate of these officers is not known at this time. However, the 5 March issue did indicate that Second Lieutenant Molisi was not one of the officers arrested at the Palace. Needless to say, the Prime Minister accused the King of complicity in the escape of Molisi and the King alleges the army officers who arrested the mutineers at the Palace left Molisi behind while they escorted the other captured police officers to the army barracks. Second Lieutenant Molisi's whereabouts are unknown but The Mirror did report in its 26 February issue that Interpol had been contacted to assist in the search for him.

silver linings for the Prime Minister and his ruling Basotho Congress Party (BCP).

In November 1996 there was a court ruling which instructed the National Executive Committee of the BCP to reconvene the 1995 Annual Party Conference and elect a new Executive Committee. The court had ruled the 1995 Annual Conference (which actually had been delayed until March 1996) which elected the current members of the Executive Committee had not been conducted properly. The court ruling effectively recognized the Executive Committee elected at the 1994 Annual Conference, headed by Deputy Party Leader, Molapo Qhobela (Mr. Ohobela is the leader of the "pressure group", a faction within the BCP mentioned in the Fall 1995 and Winter 1997 issues of FOL).

The Executive Committee did not seem to be doing very much to comply with the November 1996 court order, so the Deputy Prime Minister, Pakalitha Mosisili (the Deputy Prime Minister is the leader of a faction within the BCP opposed to the Prime Minister, as mentioned in the Fall 1995 issue of FOL), petitioned the court during the first week of January 1997 for an order to hold the Annual Conference on 17 January. Prime Minister Mokhehle submitted an affidavit requesting a postponement of the case until a later date. Judge

THE PEACE CORPS GOES TO SOUTH AFRICA

he Peace Corps bid an historic farewell today to its first-ever group of volunteers to South Africa. Following a rousing send-off at Howard University that featured a keynote address by the Rev. Jesse Jackson, the 32 Peace Corps volunteers departed for Dulles Airport.

"Sending volunteers to South Africa is a momentous step for both the Peace Corps and the people of South Africa," said Peace Corps Director Mark Gearan. "By living and working at the grass-roots level, Peace Corps volunteers can further strengthen the personal ties between our two countries. I think President Kennedy would have been proud of the addition of South Africa as a new Peace Corps country of service."

Upon arrival in South Africa, the volunteers will meet with Vice President Al Gore and South African Deputy President Thabo Mbeki in the Crossroads Township, out-(CONTINUED ON PAGE 5) **LESOTHO**

Mofolo, nevertheless, ultimately ruled the annual conference of the party which would elect the Executive Committee had to be held on either 24 January or 7 February.

Deputy Party Leader Qhobela announced at a press conference the BCP annual party conference would be held on 24 January, as directed by the court. He also denied allegations that the "Pressure Group" intended to overthrow the government of Prime Minister Mokhehle. However, during the same press conference, Mr. Qhobela stated Lesotho is "being ruled in a dilapidated manner by a group of clowns creeped by fear".

Ironically, and in complete reversal of his earlier petition, Deputy Prime Minister Mosisili petitioned the court on 23 January to postpone the conference, claiming Deputy Party Leader Qhobela had failed to make the necessary arrangements for the conference. Since there was not a ruling on this petition by 24 January, the conference was held, and the newly elected Executive Committee was virtually the same as the outgoing Executive Committee.

Prime Minister Mokhehle then announced over Radio Lesotho that he was declaring the outcome of the conference null and void. The Executive Committee subsequently announced it would be forced to take disciplinary action against the Prime Minister.

Subsequently, the court did rule on the 23 January petition of Deputy Prime Minister Mosisili and, incredibly, annulled the proceedings of the 24 January conference, claiming proper preparations had not been made for the conference. The court ruled another conference should be held either on 27 February or sometime early in March.

The conference was held in February and the outcome was the

same as the one held in January. However, the Executive Committee confirmed on 3 March that the BCP resolved during the conference to relieve the Prime Minister of his duties as leader of the party. Since a new leader had not been appointed, Deputy leader Qhobela is now the acting leader of the party. The Prime Minister later announced he was going to arrange for yet another party conference. The Prime Minister felt the Executive Committee had failed to make adequate preparations for the most recent conference and that some delegates, including himself, were prevented from entering the conference hall.

Currently, the Prime Minister has not been removed from office since that responsibility, as reported by the Acting Leader Qhobela, lies with either the King or the state council and not with the party leadership. The last issue of **The Mirror** I had received, 5 March 1997, did not have any additional information about the Prime Minister's status. I presume there will be much more on this in future issues of **The Mirror** and FOL.


The Prime Minister also has had to endure a very ominous rumor within the past several months. The details were very sketchy in The Mirror and the rumor seems to come from a nondescript organization called the Popular Front for Democracy (PFD). Essentially, the PFD is claiming that members of the Basotho National Party (BNP), including former Prime Minister Jonathan, during the 1960's and 1970's, and the current ruling party, the BCP during the 1980's, including Prime Minister Mokhehle, were collaborators with the South African apartheid government. A representative of the PFD, Joe Mamasela, called for the leadership of both the BNP and BCP to testify before Archbishop Tutu's Truth and Reconciliation Commission.

The Prime Minister has categorically denied these allegations.

side of Cape Town. Gore will introduce the volunteers both to Deputy President Mbeki and to local residents of Crossroads. The volunteers will begin their service with three months of intensive technical, language and crosscultural training.

The 32 volunteers will spend two years working with South African teachers in the country's Northern Providence to improve teaching in math, science, and other subjects traditionally underserved youth. The volunteers will also work on pro-jects in the communities where they live and work

Mandela's state visit to the White House in October 1994, where he asked President Clinton to help his address the social and economic challenges facing his country. In 1995, Vice President Gore and South African Deputy President Thabo Mbeki signed an agreement in Pretoria to send Peace Corps volunteers to South Africa.

South Africa represents the 132nd country the Peace Corps has entered in its 36-year history. Currently, about 6,500 Peace Corps volunteers are working in 91 countries in the areas of business, the environment, education, health and nutrition, and agriculture. Since 1961, more than 147,000 Americans have joined the Peace Corps.






