

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Secretary's Letter

FOL SECRETARY: Tangible tasks with intangible benefits

It has been my pleasure to serve as the Secretary to Friends of Lesotho for the past several years. Although the tasks of the office may sometimes seem mundane, the benefits derived from contributing to an organization that is having a significant, positive influence on people's lives are immeasurable.

The office of the Secretary involves a few primary functions: taking meeting minutes, receiving vote ballots, maintaining certain FOL records, and assembling the Annual Report. Minutes are taken at the regular, special, and executive meetings. The secretary sets up the meetings using freeconference.com about three weeks before the meetings. The secretary also distributes dial-in information, the draft agenda, solidifies the agenda, and distributes minutes from the prior meeting. The secretary takes notes of the meeting and distributes final notes to the board for consideration at the next meeting. The secretary is tasked with counting ballots for the

annual board election, as well as the Board members' votes on extraordinary items.

The FOL Secretary is not the Historian of the organization, but does maintain copies of Memoranda of Understanding entered into between FOL and various organizations supporting projects in Lesotho.

Finally, the FOL Secretary is responsible for assembling and producing the Annual Report. This task begins with gathering information from various sources, e.g. a President's letter, Committee Reports, various Financial Records. After this information is gathered, it is assembled into a consistent format designed to highlight FOL's accomplishments, maintain financial transparency, and recognize contributors.

The key to FOL's success is membership involvement. Because all FOL positions are volunteer, those working full-time may weary of the demands of the obligation if they must be both an officer and a Committee Chair. However, as more members get involved, all positions become more manageable. Increased member involvement also provides more opportunities for various members to hold officer or Com-

mittee Chair positions and increases members' understanding of the organization.

I strongly encourage anyone who is considering getting involved in FOL to do so. Remember that anything worthwhile involves some sacrifice. In this case, it's time. During my time at FOL I have had the pleasure of working with an exceptional group of people whose dedication to FOL has never ceased to impress me. Through their efforts various new initiatives have been launched that will ensure that FOL will continue to make significant contributions to the people of Lesotho long into the future. That's what FOL is all about, providing scholarships to students who would not otherwise be able to continue their secondary education, funding projects that provide clean water to villages, supporting orphanages, and doing whatever possible to meet critical needs identified by current volunteers in the field and others who are in the country striving to make a difference. We can't all be on the ground in Lesotho improving the quality of people's lives, but working through FOL is the next best thing to being there.

Ronna Abbott served in Matelile Ha Seeiso from 2001 – 2003 with Matelile Tajane Development Trust. She also worked with students who did not have familial support or additional financial support to attend school. She has returned to Lesotho each year to enroll these students in school. Ronna is retired from sales and finds joy in fundraising at her church and time with her two grandchildren. She found her PCV service very gratifying and believes that FOL aligns with her ideals, working to support Lesotho's own efforts. Ronna will be on the Donations Committee and an NGO Liasion.

Deena Rowe-Krumdick served as an education volunteer at Ha Moruthane from 1987 – 1989. She has a variety of experience in a wide range of fields and is cur-

rently a Master Gardener Volunteer with Colorado State University. In addition, she volunteers at her children's school, and serves as a co-treasurer of her son's high school. She's interested in supporting the financing of the Tuition Assistance Program as a member of the Donations Committee.



Book Review

"Singing Away The Hunger" by `Mpho M'atsepo Nthunya

The autobiography of a Masotho woman as told, in traditional Basotho storytelling fashion, to Dr. K. Limaktso Kendall, an American teacher who visited Lesotho. The book takes you through 'Mpho's childhood in Lesotho (she was born in 1930); her young adulthood in Benoni, South Africa during the time of apartheid and her return to Lesotho as a mature woman.

This is a fairly short book, easily read in an afternoon, unless you stumble over the Sesotho words and Basotho names like I did during my first read. But have patience, read slowly, absorb the culture and savour each chapter as a short story, which they are. To give you an idea, one chapter title is "Death by Novena". It tells volumes about the influence religion has on young 'Mpho. Another chapter is titled "The Child is Burning", which gives you an idea of the harsh treatment 'Mpho receives from her grandmother.

Years later (in Chapter 9) the now dead grandmother is still haunting `Mpho, at least according to "traditional healers"

Near the end of the book, `Mpho talks briefly about what she sees as the beginnings of the illness we now all know as the HIV/AIDS pandemic.

'Mpho is still alive and living in Lesotho today. I imagine she is still telling stories to her grandchildren and great grandchildren. So, let your imagination take hold as you read "Singing Away the Hunger" and you might just hear 'Mpho's voice as she tells her story.

This book is a must read for anyone who has been to Lesotho (RPCVs--this means you all); who is currently living in Lesotho (PCVs and Basotho of all ages); family and friends of loved ones living in Lesotho; and anyone who is looking for an inspirational, educational and true story about an amazing African woman. To quote another reviewer who lived in Lesotho and bought the book out of a sense of nostalgia: "Truly a joy to read. I laughed and I cried".

Huge Diamond Find

In September, mining group Gem Diamond reported finding one of the world's largest diamonds, a near-flawless 478 carats white gem, in Letseng Mine. With four of the world's 20 largest rough diamonds being found there, Letseng is now one of the most productive diamond mines in history. The diamond is estimated to be valued at more than \$12 million.



Land Ownership for Women

In May, the National Assembly passed an amendment to the Land Act that would require that both spouses be listed to register land. The proposed amendment repeals some provision of the Land Act of 1979 that provided that women could only have the right of land ownership after the death of the spouse. The Bill will provide joint entitlement to land by persons married in community of property. One member of parliament spoke in opposition to the amendment saying that it defied "Basotho traditions, customs, and laws of God." Yet another suggested that the spouses resolve such matters through chiefs and not via the courts.



Boys overtake girls in primary education

A recently issued report of the Bureau of Statistics contains statistics of primary school enrollment for the period 2000 to 2006. These show that in 2004, boys for the first time in nearly a century outnumbered girls in primary

schools.

The sexual imbalance in primary schools in the past was largely caused by boys being required for herding duties in the absence of men who were migrant workers in South Africa. Migrant work opportunities in South Africa are now very much reduced (less than half as many as 20 years ago), and there is the added problem that cattle theft is rampant with robbers using firearms against which school age boys cannot defend themselves. Consequently, cattle herding is now again largely an adult male occupation. Moreover, the existence of free primary school education, including a daily meal, provides a considerable incentive for all children to attend school.



Lesotho's national symbols highlighted in new book

Scott Rosenberg served as a Peace Corps Volunteer in Lesotho from 1989 – 1992. He was awarded a Ph.D. in History from Indiana University. The National University of Lesotho Institute of Southern African Studies has now published his thesis as a book entitled Promises of Moshoeshoe: culture, nationalism and identity in Lesotho, 1902 – 1966.



Water Crisis

Three years of persistent drought has led to a water crisis in Lesotho. The water table has receded and boreholes and springs have dried

up. According to the Lesotho Department of Rural Water Supplies (DRWS), 30 percent of boreholes, wells, and springs in rural areas have dried up. Residents are thus dependent on limited surface water. DRWS statistics indicate that up to 30 percent of households nationwide lacked access to safe drinking water and adequate sanitation facilities. A study by the Ministry of Health and Social Welfare found that almost 60 percent of the health centers in Lesotho did not have access to clean water. In response to the crisis, the U.K.'s Department of International Development pledged \$1 million, which UNICEF has used to provide and rehabilitate hand pumps, construct boreholes, and erect water tanks.

Lesotho newspaper scene now increasingly dominated by English language papers

Ten years ago in 1998, Lesotho's regular weekly newspapers were largely in Sesotho. They consisted then of the political party newspapers Makatolle, Mohlanka and Lololi together with the Catholic Church newspaper Moeletsi oa Basotho, the government-owned Lentsoe la Basotho and the independently owned Moafrika. The weekly English newspapers were The Mirror, Mopheme, and Southern Star. Today the English papers are Informative, Lesotho Monitor, Lesotho Times, Lesotho Today, Maddhouse Weekly, Maloti

News, Public Eye, The Voice of Free Democrats, Watchdog (which struggles to be a weekly, and also struggles to write English), and Weekly Mail (which despite its name is also not always weekly). As for Sesotho newspapers, four of those being published 10 years ago remain, namely Lentsoe la Basotho, Moafrika, Moeletsi oa Basotho and Mololi.



Lesotho performs disastrously in Olympic Games

A team of five Basotho left for Beijing on Monday 28 July to participate in the Olympic Games. The team was made up of three men and one woman, all marathon runners, who had had expensive pre-Olympics training in Eldoret, Kenya. There was also one boxer who had been at a training camp in Tunisia. Lesotho also provided one of the team of 34 international referees assigned to officiate in the boxing events. Nine officials accompanied the Lesotho participants, a fact that brought criticism in the press.

Alas! None of the marathon runners completed the course, while the boxer was eliminated in the preliminary stages. At the beginning of the 2008 Games, Lesotho was one of 31 African countries that had never won an Olympic medal.



New Lesotho heron species recorded and Burchell's Courser reappears after 107 years

There is no published Lesotho bird atlas, although birders are encouraged to send in monthly bird cards either to Dr. Ian Love at NUL or to David Ambrose. The Lesotho bird total was recently 349 species, of which 19 species were purely historical, defined to mean that all known records are earlier than 1950.

However, the species total has risen to 350 and one of the historical species has been again recorded in Lesotho.

The new species is the Green-backed Heron, *Butorides striata*. The species now recorded apparently for the first time in 107 years is Burchell's Courser, *Cursorius rufus*. The 1901 recording says, "Uncommon in Basutoloand but in 1901 two large flocks came to Mafeteng from O.R.C. [Orange River Colony] probably owing grass growing too rank and long during the war [the reference is to abandoned farms, as a result of the British taking the owners as prisoners-of-war and putting their families into concentration camps during the Anglo-Boer War]."



Media Regulation

On July 21, 2008, the Lesotho Communications Authority (LCA) suspended Harvest FM for three months for "failure to cooperate with the authority." The suspension comes after the Lesotho Telecommunications Act (LTA) was amended to provide the Minister with the power to shut down radio stations without a hearing if the Minister determines that the radio station has violated the broadcasting law. The suspension came after the principal secretary of the Ministry of Communications and the police commissioner filed defamation complaints against the station.

The Committee to Protect Journalists, a New York-based nonprofit that works to safeguard press freedom worldwide, condemned the decision to suspend the station. Reporters

letter the organization stated, "The closure of Lesotho's only privately-owned radio station is a serious violation of free speech . . . Harvest FM's closure, which has been widely condemned by local and international press freedom activists, will only cause polarization and foster a climate of hostility between the government and the media."

Harvest FM returned to the air on October 22, 2008.

In October, the High Court of Lesotho found that the defunct Lesotho weekly, "The Mirror," had defamed Prime Minister Pakalitha Mosisili, and the court ordered the publication, its editor, and EPIC Printers to pay a M50,000 fine. The court found that the paper negligently published allegations without establishing their truthfulness.

Also on October 22, 2008, the High Court of Lesotho sentenced broadcast journalist Thabo Thakalekoala to two years in prison or a M200 fine for sedition. He also received a second two year sentence for criminal defamation and subversion; this sentence was suspended on the condition that Thakalekoala not commit a similar offence in the next three years.

Thakalekoala was charged with sedition after he read a letter on the air that called for the arrest of Prime Minister Pakalitha Mosisili and his senior officials for corruption. Thakalekoala contended that he received threatening calls insisting that he read the letter and that he did not think that the letter referred to the Prime Minister.

Thakalekoala has paid the M200 fine.

Family Literacy, Books for Basotho Homes By Jane A. Hale



As Peace Corps Volunteers, you probably had occasion to share your books with friends in Lesotho. Many of you have worked hard to ship large quantities of books to schools, libraries, and other organizations. All of us know how eagerly books are received in this country with high literacy rates but no bookstores. When a U.S.-based pediatric literacy program called Reach Out and Read was instituted at Baylor Pediatric AIDS Clinic in Maseru in 2006, the thousands of children's picture books it distributed to families with very young children were welcomed with great enthusiasm. In many cases, these became the only books other than the Bible in a family's home.

It didn't take long before parents began requesting beautiful picture books for young children written in Sesotho about Lesotho. Family Literacy Lesotho [FLL] was thus founded in 2007 by about 40 volunteers from many sectors of Basotho society—including several Peace Corps Volunteers. FLL's mission is: to encourage the development of beautiful children's picture books in Sesotho about Lesotho and put them in the hands and homes of Basotho children. FLL's first project was to sponsor a nationwide Sesotho story-writing contest, to which 288 entries were submitted from all over the country. Her Majesty

Queen 'Masenate Mohato Seeiso has graciously agreed to be the official patron of FLL, indicating the importance of the children's picture book project to the preservation and enrichment of Basotho culture. FLL's first two picture books for infants and toddlers were published this July at the historic Morija Sesuto Book Depot and Print Works:

• Kamohelo Tlhahong ea Ngoana oa Mosotho (A Traditional Welcoming of a Mosotho Child), written, illustrated, and translated by Peter Maphatsoe

These are the *first-ever* children's picture books in Sesotho about Lesotho! Written, illustrated, copyrighted, and published by Basotho in Lesotho, they are a vehicle for,

as well as a potentially important component of, the rich Basotho cultural heritage.

A generous grant from the Kellogg Foundation has allowed FLL to buy half of the initial press run of the first two books for free distribution to families with very young children through Lesotho's health care facilities. FLL is committed to helping sell the remaining books in Lesotho, the U.S., and elsewhere so the publisher will be willing to take on future children's picture book projects that we and others may propose.

Shortly after FLL was established, one of its members, Peter Maphatsoe, a 23-year-old artist, founded a sister organization, the *Children's Art Organisation of Lesotho* [CAO]. CAO works closely with FLL to develop picture books for children and to promote family art and literacy education in Lesotho. CAO established its initial head-quarters in a small room in Khubetsoana, a populous neighborhood on the outskirts of Maseru. About 45 children began to come to the site before and after school and on weekends, to draw, paint, read, play, and hang around with peers and the young adult artists, who looked after them beautifully.

FLL and CAO have recently received an \$11,800 Rotary International Matching Grant to build on their initial successes by establishing a Family Art and Literacy Centre in Khubetsoana. The project is sponsored by Maloti Rotary in Lesotho and Waltham and Middleboro Rotary in Massachusetts. The Centre provides a place for the CAO artists to keep their supplies safely, to read with children, to work on FLL illustrations as well as their own pro-

jects, and to teach art to children and families. Since there is no place in Lesotho to buy children's picture books or to view the work of its many talented young artists, the Centre will also have a display and sales room for the books, arts, and crafts it produces.

Friends of Lesotho members are most welcome to visit the Centre when in Lesotho. Other ways to support its work include ordering the books, luggage tags, bookmarks, and umbrellas featured on the enclosed flyer (see order form on page 8), or making a tax-deductible donation. Even better, if you would like to write and/or illustrate a children's picture story about Lesotho—in Sesotho or in English—FLL and CAO would be happy to receive your submissions and work with you to get them in print.

Library project







