President's Message

Lumelang Metsoalle,

There is always the danger your eyes will glaze over while reading the President's Letter, and that might be particularly true of this edition. However, if you are a PCV or RPCV who used FOL funds through the Volunteer Advisory Committee (VAC) or the Tuition Assistance Program (TAP), you might be interested in some recent changes. One of the main missions that Friends of Lesotho tries to fulfill is the support of PCV projects and tuition for Basotho school children. The logistics of transferring money to Lesotho has given us more headaches than any other aspect of that support. FOL has been busy finding a solution to that problem for the past couple of months.

When FOL began funding TAP and VAC, Peace Corps had bank accounts to which FOL either sent checks or wired money. The TAP and VAC committee chairpersons wrote checks from those accounts for scholarships and projects. About five years ago, Peace Corps informed FOL that new PC regulations prohibited volunteers and staff from handling checks and managing the bank accounts. When 'Me Thembi retired, she took over those responsibilities. Eventually the duties passed to Craig Anderson, an RPCV who worked at the U.S. Embassy. Craig recently transferred to another country, so FOL was again looking for someone to handle check writing.

The solution to this problem has been to form a relationship with the Peace Corps Partnership Program, which will make it easier and less expensive for FOL to support PCV projects. PCPP has a Lesotho Country Fund that can be used to fund smaller PCV projects similar to those funded through the VAC. PCVs will still submit project proposals to VAC and PC Staff for approval. Once

approval is granted, the Country Director can use the PCPP Country Fund to provide funds for the project. FOL will begin sending money to the PCPP Country Fund to support those projects.

The PC Lesotho TAP committee will also begin making changes to the Tuition Assistance Program, and FOL will fund that program through PCPP. FOL will begin reviewing larger project proposals submitted to PCPP by PCVs and helping to fund some of those projects. We will also continue to independently fund projects that do not involve PCVs.

The relationship between PCPP and FOL has some advantages. It eliminates wire-transfer fees and bank commissions. It also eliminates the need to find someone to manage the bank account in Lesotho. The greatest advantage is that PCPP is able to provide us with greater detail about the projects that FOL supports and more reliable reporting after a project is finished.



At the beginning of September, Friends of Lesotho received very sad news. PCV Thomas Maresco was killed in a robbery attempt in Maseru. Friends of Lesotho is deeply saddened to hear of Tom's passing, and we want to express our condolences to his family and friends and the Peace Corps Community in Lesotho. Tom wrote about his Peace Corps service in his blog. It was clear he loved being a volunteer and was making a difference in his village near Katse Dam. FOL will be looking at how we can contribute to a memorial in Tom's name.

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Laptops to Lesotho, an FOL-funded Project: Chapter One

History

It all started so innocently. A few years ago, my father and I each bought a \$200 computer, called an XO laptop, from the One Laptop Per Child “Give One, Get One” program. I liked the idea of giving a laptop to a child in a developing country, but I was also curious about what made these computers so special.

The XO laptops we received were perfect for kids, but, not being kids, we didn’t get much out of them, and soon they were collecting dust. In mid-2009, I decided it was time to give them to someone who could really appreciate them, so I contacted PC/L about donating them to a school.

Long story short, a primary school in Ketane received them, fell in love with them, and asked how to get more. One

thing led to another, and before I knew it, I found myself as president of a 501(c)(3) nonprofit organization with a staff of 11 dedicated volunteers in the U.S., South Africa, and Lesotho. One year later, here I am, planning a trip to Lesotho in November with about 50 laptops and a heart filled with hopes for the children of Ketane. Talk about a whirlwind!

Why Laptops?

When I first tell people about this project, I can see their skepticism...Laptops? Really? Why laptops? Computers are expensive, and, well, aren’t they a bit of a luxury for a poor nation? Isn’t there a better way to use the money? What about books, pens and pencils, paper, desks, classrooms, tuition?

Yes, I answer, all those things you list are important, but they do *absolutely no good* if there aren’t good teachers, if a child can’t attend school, or if a child loses interest because the lessons are boring. A laptop is pencil and paper, desk, classroom, teacher, and an entire library *full* of books all wrapped into one. And yet they are also so much more...an endless supply of time, information, one-on-one interaction, and reinforcement.

Not to mention that XO’s are really fun, entertaining, and cute. Even in the U.S., where children are jaded by technology, kids will cross a room to check out these

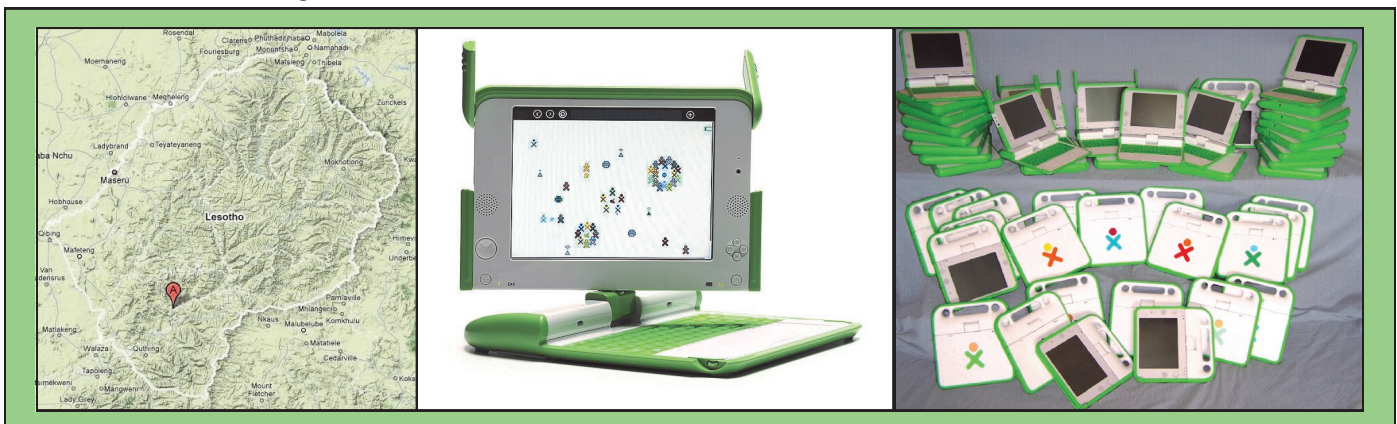
cool little laptops. I was working on an XO in the park one day, and I was swarmed by kids. Then, when they saw all the things they could do with an XO, they got *really* excited.

What Makes XO’s Special

XO’s are water-, dust-, and drop-resistant, i.e. virtually kid proof. They have an internal camera, microphone, speakers, and a screen visible in bright sun. They have low power needs and contain no hazardous materials. Each has internal networks that automatically connect to other XO’s, and they are wi-fi capable. They come with dozens of “activities” designed to teach kids while they are having fun. There are also other activities and curriculum resources available for them, designed by groups in South Africa and Lesotho, with a distinctly African feel.

Child Ownership

I suppose I should mention here that most of these laptops won’t be given to the school in Ketane. They will be given to the children. Individual ownership, one-on-one, children free to take *their* laptop home and use it in their spare time, free to explore it at their own speed, free to read books at home, to follow their interests, to play with it, to become comfortable and familiar with it, to take pride in it ...

Children will hold the power in their hands to change their own future. Decades of classroom education with books, paper, and pencil have repeatedly failed the children of Ketane. It's time to look at the problem from a different angle and try something new.

The people of Ketane understand this, and they see the great potential of these computers. A telling example: the parents encouraged their children to go to school for extra computer classes *during the harvest* when their help is needed in the fields.

That, I say, is "why laptops."

Community-based, Community Run

A second, major component of our project is grassroots community support and organization. Since its inception, this has been a community project. They requested it, and they've supported it with their time, labor, materials, and enthusiasm. The staff from two primary schools are in charge of on-the-ground operations. Those of us in the U.S. are merely facilitators for them, getting things started, and mentoring and training them, with the hope that one day soon we will be able to hand the entire

organization over to them, and through them to the community of Ketane, to run completely on their own.

The Future

Once we get the program established at the primary school, we hope to provide laptops to orphans, herdboys, and other disenfranchised children unable to attend school. There are also all kinds of spinoff possibilities: dissemination of HIV/AIDS information; peer counselors available for online chats that encourage safe, responsible behavior; remote access to the local clinic for video health consultations; small student-run entrepreneurial projects; and technical skills training using the electrical system, solar power, and information technology hardware.

Program Costs

Remember those kids in the park? When they found out how *cheap* an XO is, they wanted to buy one for themselves *with their own money*. Our program cost is miniscule compared to the benefit. About \$300-350 per child covers a laptop, shipping, solar power, and internet service. Over the average lifespan of a laptop, that's about \$50-60 per year, an amount that some people pay *per month* for internet, and chump change to many American kids. That *small* amount can give a high-quality education to a Mosotho child.

FOL's Contribution

FOL's support in our earlier stages of development has helped convince others our cause is worth supporting. We are now partnered with three other organizations, and, with FOL's generous contribution of \$1,436, we have surpassed \$10,000 in cash donations, pledges, grants, and donated supplies. Thank you, FOL!

WASHINGTON, D.C., Sept. 4, 2010 – Peace Corps Director Aaron S. Williams is saddened to announce the death of Peace Corps volunteer Thomas “Tom” Maresco in Lesotho. Tom, 24, died as a result of a gunshot wound on Sept. 3 in Maseru, the capital of Lesotho. The investigation into this incident is ongoing, but at this time it appears it may have been an attempted robbery.

"Tom was an exceptional volunteer, leader, teacher and coach – he was an integral part of his host community where he shared his passion for teaching, music and sports," said Director Williams. "We are deeply saddened by this tragic event, and I ask that you keep Tom's family and our volunteers and staff in Lesotho in your thoughts and prayers."

Tom, of Port St. Lucie, Fla., was a secondary education teacher in the village of Katse in the highlands district of Thaba-Tseka. He arrived in Lesotho for Peace Corps service in November 2009. A graduate of the University of Florida, Tom served as a science teacher in Lesotho. He was an active member of his local community in Katse and coached youth in a number of sports including basketball and swimming. Tom became his district's representative on the Peace Corps Lesotho HIV/AIDS committee and was committed to developing innovative ways to address HIV awareness and prevention among young people. He was scheduled to complete his Peace Corps service in January 2012.

Friends of Lesotho sends its heartfelt condolences to Tom's family. We all grieve with them during these difficult times. A funeral Mass and burial service for Thomas Carmine Maresco, Jr., was held on September 16 in Port St. Lucie, Florida. In lieu of flowers, the family requests donations be made at any PNC bank branch to the Thomas C. Maresco Jr. Memorial Medical Scholarship Fund at Indian River State College.

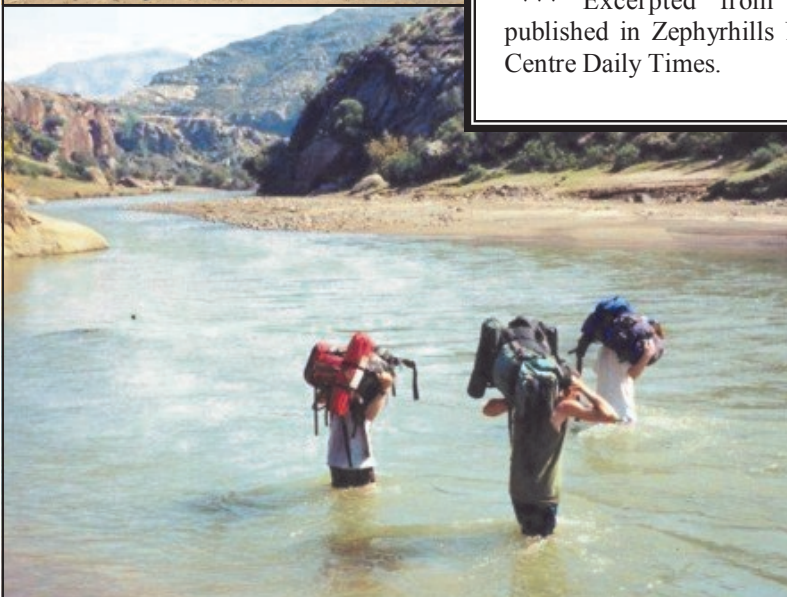
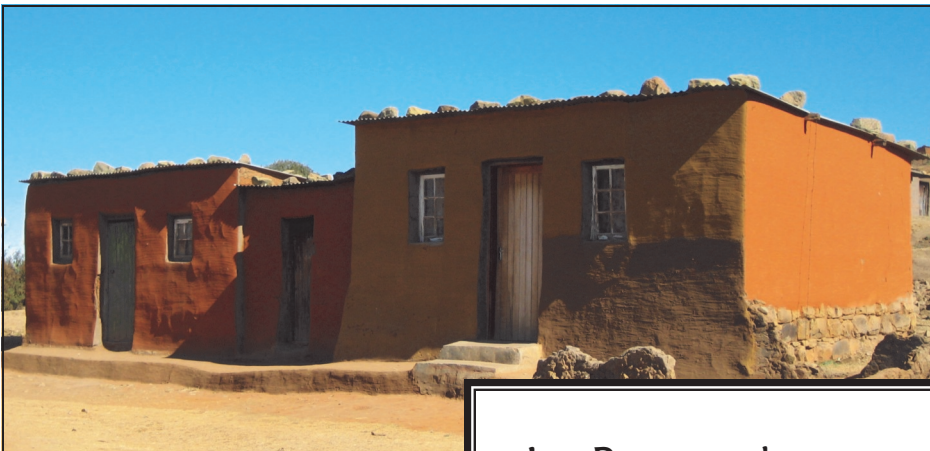

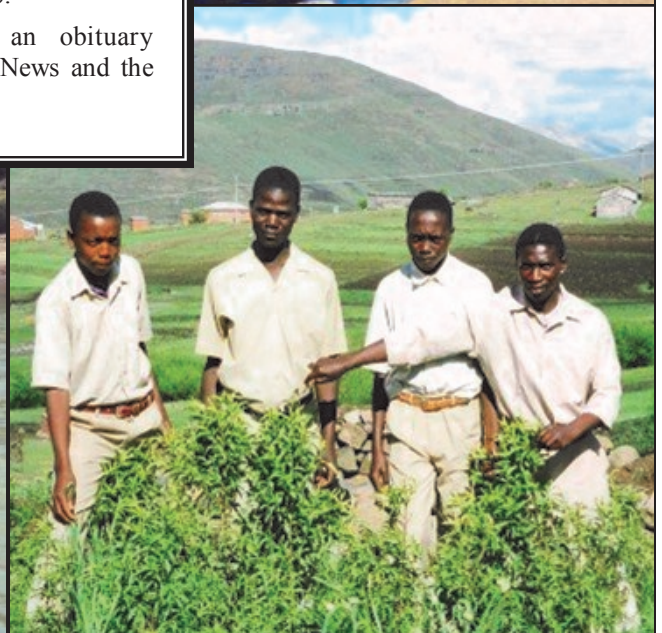

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Fundraising Committee News

A New Way to Donate

Friends can now donate to FOL on line at razoo. Razoo describes itself as “a social network for social good” that aims to promote sustainable human development.” They’ve established an easy way to give online to non-profit causes. To make a contribution to FOL, simply go to <http://www.razoo.com/story/Friends-Of-Lesotho>. Enter the amount you wish to give and click on Donate. You’ll be asked for credit card details (the site is secure and protects donor information), then enter the info, click on Donate Now, and you’re done. The full amount you contribute comes to Friends of Lesotho. Razoo pays transaction fees.

Contribute While You Search and Shop

Two other ways to direct money to FOL are to use **GoodSearch** as your Internet search engine and make online purchases through **GoodShop**. FOL is now listed with both.

Goodsearch has developed a way to direct a portion of Internet advertising fees to charities that searchers choose. So, when you click on a paid link during a search, part of advertiser dollars (not your own) get passed along to the organization you choose to support (e.g., FOL). Goodsearch.com is powered by Yahoo’s search engine.

When you shop through **GoodShop** at one of the site’s retail partners, GoodSearch receives a commission, which it directs to the non-profit charity of your choice. The amount donated is different for each retailer, but it averages approximately 3% of the total sale (the percentage is indicated below the merchant’s logo).

The easiest way to access both these sites on a regular basis is to download a GoodSearch toolbar for your browser. The toolbar features links to both GoodSearch and GoodShop. You’ll find it at <http://www.goodsearch.com/toolbar/mode/>. Otherwise, just go to goodsearch.com. Enter Friends of Lesotho in the box titled “Who do you GoodSearch for?” and click on Verify. Then begin your search. GoodShop works the same way.

Join FOL on Facebook

Friends of Lesotho now has a cause site on Facebook, but we need members. To join the cause, go to http://www.causes.com/causes/505986?m=9e4cc0c7&recruiter_id=99040922. Click on Join Cause. You’ll be asked to login to Facebook first, or to sign up if you don’t have an account. You needn’t donate to join the FOL cause, but you can if you like. The main thing now is to boost our cause member numbers.

New Fundraising Chair

Peter Neumann has generously volunteered to become chair of FOL’s fundraising committee. Peter and his wife, Maria, were Peace Corps Volunteers in Mohale’s Hoek, 2004-06. Bill Moore has resigned from the chair, concerned that he would be unable to fulfill the position’s duties. He is accompanying his wife, Mary Wagner, to Lusaka, Zambia, where she will teach as a Fullbright Scholar at the University of Zambia and work with the Lubutu Library Project. Lifetime Membership Impact

Thank you Susan Bruckner and Brent Schaeffer for converting your regular memberships into Lifetime Memberships.

At the current rate of exchange, a basic \$250 Lifetime Membership equals 1,800 rand. The following is an example of the potential impact Lifetime Memberships can have to support projects in Lesotho. Two Lifetime Memberships can cover the monthly cost of providing two meals a day to the 45 orphan preschoolers being cared for at the Little Angels Day Care and Pre-school program in Thabo Bosiu. That is 90 meals each day times 30 days, or 2,700 meals a month.

But, as they say, a picture is worth a thousand words.

Little Angels has received financial support from a private foundation--support which will be running out at the end of 2010. During the last couple of years FOL has provided support to several small projects at Little Angels as part of Prof. Scott Rosenberg's annual student volunteer trips to Lesotho. Thanks to contacts made by Scott, Donations Committee Chair, FOL will be collaborating with BloomAfrica and his local Rotary Club in Ohio to help fund the 2011 food and operating costs at Little Angels. The Little Angels Day Care and Pre-school project was initiated by RPCV Rose Paradise, whose PC service started in 2003. Rose stayed in Lesotho and has worked closely with locals to provide the basic necessities for these orphans.

Thanks to the generosity of FOL's donors and regular and lifetime members, these little angels will have a chance to learn and be well fed for another year.

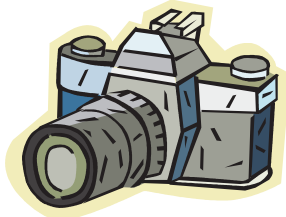
