It's hard to believe that it has already been a year since our 25th Anniversary Reunion in Washington, D.C. FOL continues to find ways to connect with our members and friends by having a presence at the regional meetings sponsored by the NPCA. See Richard Rowan's report on the Minneapolis Conference held this summer for more details.

Hope you were able to see Team Lesotho marching in the Parade of Nations at the opening ceremonies of the Olympics in London last month. Though no Mosotho athlete "brought home the gold," we can all be proud of Team Lesotho's participation in the track &field events and swimming.

The Donations Committee continues to review applications for funding, work with the Peace Corps Partnership Program, and others who request support for their projects. The Board recently approved funding for the Wittenberg University Project, a library project in Mokhotlong, Laptops to Lesotho and the Little Angels Orphanage. \$20,275 was sent to the Phelisanong and TAP Scholarship Funds. A total of \$33,579.26 has been sent to Lesotho this year as a result of the generous support of our members and friends.

Dr. Scott Rosenberg, FOL Embassy Liaison, participated in a summit hosted by the Lesotho Embassy this summer to discuss how those doing work in Lesotho can better work together. Scott's report in this issue of the newsletter discusses how the various aid representatives are planning on different forms of networking and how to put those with similar needs and interests in contact with each other.

FOL is very fortunate to have Scott on the Board, serving on the Donations Committee and as Embassy Liaison. Scott's research publications and work in Lesotho make him a unique resource to the FOL Board. As a Professor of African History specializing in Lesotho Studies, Scott has valuable knowledge of the socio-cultural and historical dynamics in Lesotho. Scott's service-learning projects in Lesotho with his Wittenberg University students have been featured in past Annual Reports and newsletters. His annual trips to Lesotho enable Scott to gain first-hand knowledge of the projects FOL funds, network with potential partners, and stay connected to the PC Lesotho staff and PCVs. Through his work with the Springfield Ohio and Maseru Rotary Clubs, Scott has provided FOL with the means to safely transfer funds to non-PC projects. Through his many partnerships and connections, Scott has raised several hundred thousand dollars to support a wide variety of projects in Lesotho. Scott also serves as a Senior Project Consultant for BLOOM Africa.

The FOL Board is interested in knowing of anyone traveling to Lesotho, whether on personal trips or to work on development projects. FOL often needs someone to make contacts for us in Lesotho which may involve a short visit to the Peace Corps Office, with PCVs, or projects we are supporting. 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NPCA Annual Meeting

The National Peace Corps Association (NPCA) held its annual meeting this summer in Minneapolis. FOL had a booth at the conference that was staffed by a number of FOL members from the Minnesota area. The conference centered around the 3rd goal of Peace Corps, which is to bring an understanding of the rest of the world to America.

The conference included a number of presentations and displays of interest to FOL members. Peace Corps Response (formerly Crisis Corps) provides 3-12 month opportunities to serve as volunteers in Peace Corps countries. The program was originally limited to RPCVs but many of the positions are now open to any qualified person. This allows RPCVs with non-RPCV spouses to apply for positions. A new program offered by the NPCA is Next Step Travel. This program hosts educational and service trips to PC countries. See www.peacecorpsconnect.org/resources/next-step-travel for more information.

Advocacy was a major theme of the conference. There were sessions on how to get involved in advocating for programs that RPCVs have said were important, including programs to alleviate hunger and poverty and improve public health at home and abroad. Some of the efforts described also included advocating for a stronger Peace Corps and lobbying for programs that affect our countries of service. RPCV and former APCD Ken Patterson gave a presentation on how his organization, RESULTS, educates members of Congress and other policy makers on a variety of issues important to RPCVs. RESULTS has local chapters that provide a means for people to contact and educate their own members of Congress and local policy makers. RESULTS has worked with the NPCA on a number of issues. There were breakout sessions that gave opportunities for attendees to exchange ideas about fundraising and organizing social and service activities.

The conference provided a chance to connect with RPCVs from many countries and to reconnect with some folks who served in Lesotho. Next year's annual conference will be in Boston.

The NPCA will be holding two one-day expos in September. These one-day expos include displays and presentations of interest to RPCVs. They will be held on Sept. 22 in Providence, RI and Sept. 29 in Pasadena, CA. FOL's Victor Cuevas will be representing us at the Pasadena. 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Peace Corps Service Vignette—A Helping Hand

Something's up. Ntate Litebeho yells from the top of the street, "Ntate Pete!" Usually he calls me Ntate Maholo – meaning grandfather. He motions me toward him.

I am walking that way anyway. It is very hot in the Hoek this January mid-afternoon day. I have decided to take a 4+1 back home. I usually walk home in any weather, but this day I have too much weight in my pack and two Christmas packages – one under each arm. Better to take the ride; there is still a 10 minute walk once I get off. The cost is 3 Maloti – about \$.50 and seems a particularly good value just now. A 4+1 is a compact car size vehicle that transports 4 passengers plus the driver. You wait until it is completely filled before it leaves. It only goes to one place – a crossroads near our home, drops the passengers and waits for four replacements before returning to Mohales Hoek.

I reach the taxi rank – a dusty, open field littered with trash, a couple of sleeping dogs and located just across from the abandoned BP gas station. Ntate Litebeho is smiling. He is usually pretty friendly, but this smile is more than that. He is there in front of the taxi with two men – one is the 4+1 driver. The vehicle is a familiar and ancient Dodge Colt. The windows are permanently frozen up meaning that today the greenhouse effect will be real special. The hood is held down with a wire. The trunk locks, but you need a strong stick to lever it open. Some doors do not open from the outside and some do not open from the inside. The tires are bald.

And, I see, one of them is flat.

There is some machine-gun Sesotho with gesturing towards the tire, the trunk, and then me. Ntate Litebeho motions to the driver who goes into the trunk and gets the spare tire and lug nut wrench out. He drops them in front of the flat and then goes to the brush by the field. The others stand by the front of the car and nod at me and I nod back. I have that smile on my face that pretends to show them I understand what's going on. We stand there and smile and nod.

The driver comes back with a big rock. The fuzzy picture in my mind takes focus as I realize there is no car jack. Yep, my auto maintenance skills are about to take a new turn. The driver quickly loosens the lug nuts and squats by the wheel. He nods. Ntate Litebeho, his pal and me squat and grab the Dodge's front end and lift. The rock goes underneath the frame in a flash and we set the car down on it. I wipe my hands, smile and wonder if vertebrate can actually scream out loud.

The flat tire comes off. Wait, the spare requires more clearance. Find another rock, lift again, slip in the new rock and the good tire is mounted. Lift once more, the car is on four "good" tires and we are shaking each other's hands and acting like it was nothing at all.

I get in the 4+1 thankful to sit down. I don't mind the heat; feels pretty good. I won't worry about ever standing up again until we reach our destination.....

Khotso! Pula! Nala!

On July 15th, Scott Rosenberg, Embassy liaison and member of the donations committee, participated in a summit on development in Lesotho hosted by Ambassador Sebatane at the Lesotho Embassy in Washington, D.C. Other organizations present at the meeting included; representatives from Phelps-Stokes, Millennium Challenge Corporation, and Pepfar. A number of former Peace Corps Volunteers and Basotho Nationals were also present. The Ambassador hoped to gather those who were doing projects in Lesotho as well as those who are interested in doing work in Lesotho. Based on many of the issues that have been raised by FOL during its meetings, FOL representatives noted the problem it faced in finding funding for certain projects and finding organizations to partner with who have mutual interests. Once the discussion started, the main focus of the meeting was dedicated to discussing networking and creating a website/forum which would help those doing projects in Lesotho better communicate with each other. FOL has offered to host the site.




Qholaqhoe Mountain Connections

In 2007 I served as a PCV in Qholaqhoe, Butha-Buthe, Lesotho. Soon after arriving I was walking through my rural village and stopped to watch a group of women, many with babies on their backs, building a new road with shovels, pick axes and rusty wheelbarrows. Two women walked over to me and through gestures, limited Sesotho, limited English, and many laughs, they asked if I knew where they could find vegetable seeds for their orphan garden. They invited me to come to the garden on Saturday, "everyone comes on Saturday."

The garden had been in existence for six years and continues to thrive today. The Likoting Village chief had donated a small plot of land for the garden and a mud, dung and rock building served as a cooking shed and meeting place. Ten men and women started the garden project and two grandmothers, Me Mampho and Me Mamotloang have served as leaders, working with the "double orphans" teaching them how to grow, harvest and cook vegetables.

All the orphans and many local villagers come on Saturdays to work in the garden and cook a large meal. Everyone shares in the work, the meal, a game of netball and leaves with food. Every time I joined a Saturday gathering I was struck by the happiness and playfulness of the children in spite of the tremendous difficulties they face every day.

When I visited with the Qholaqhoe Mountain Chief, Morena Thabo, and asked about the location of the orphanage where these children lived he asked me to sit with him for a while. He said, "We live like elephants. When a mother dies the herd gathers around. In Qholaqhoe we want our orphans to live with us and be proud of being Basotho." Many of these 113 children, ranging in age from infants to 20 year olds, live with family, neighbors or friends. Many live alone with older siblings assuming the tasks and responsibility of parents. While Lesotho now provides free education for AIDS orphans, the daily demands of living mean that many orphans simply do not have time to go to school. Young boys are needed to herd cattle and girls are needed for cooking and caring for younger siblings.

After returning home to New York, the memories of Likoting Village and the hard working grandmothers and orphans were constantly in my thoughts. It did not take more than a few minutes of talking with my two sisters-in-law, Pic and Debbi, before we decided to see if there was more we could do to help. We are each grandmothers ourselves and hungry children, even thousands of miles away, are important to us. We visited the garden in 2008 and after talking with the grandmothers about what the needed, it was decided that a sustainable water source for the garden would be a tremendous help. During the dry season the garden withered and even though the children walked down to the river to collect water in plastic containers, it was not enough. Food was scarce during these months and children were hungry.

We formed a 501c3 organization, Qholaqhoe Mountain Connections (QMC) and began talking with anyone who would listen. The villagers told us they could build a stone water storage tank but they lacked the money for cement and pipe. While we gathered funding, the orphans gathered stones and one year later the tank was completed. It was absolutely marvelous to return and see a lush, green garden with raised beds filled with pumpkins, squash, peas and beans.

A new PCV, Adam Santos, came to teach at Qholaqhoe High School and after a visit to the orphan garden knew he wanted to help. He raised funds for a strong metal fence to keep the cattle and sheep out of the garden.

A current PCV, Kevin Koryto, visited the garden and said in his blog, "I visited the garden for the first time on Saturday. It is an inspirational place to see the care that these few Bo-Me are able to provide to the children. Everyone pitches in to tend to the garden and help out." Kevin is now helping the children tear down the old cooking shed which is no longer safe and QMC is raising funds for a new building.

Two years ago QMC provided the funds for 100 laying hens, cages, feed for one year and medicine so that protein could help with the chronic malnutrition. The project is now self-sustaining. The grandmothers sell the older chickens to purchase new hens, orphans carry flats of eggs on their heads and travel to other villages to sell the extra eggs. They use the funds to purchase cooking oil, maize meal, toothpaste and soap. The orphans tend to the feeding, watering and cleaning and the chickens produce about 90 eggs per day!

Last year QMC purchased a Jersey cow with help from the Lesotho Agriculture Department. After much haggling, traveling and searching, a beautiful registered Jersey was found in South Africa and she has now given birth to a heifer calf. The orphans milk and feed her, with help from the grandmothers, and the younger children now have a sustainable source of milk.

Often work as a PCV can be lonely and difficult, but this village boosts your spirits and gives you hope for these children. It is an amazing place. You immediately feel welcomed and involved. The integrity, honesty, love and respect are evident in the long standing efforts of these people to keep their orphans together and safe. They truly live like elephants!

Gem Diamonds Suffers as Prices Slump

Gem Diamonds, the Australia and Africa-focused minerals mining company that runs the Letseng mine, among others, has delayed two development projects in Botswana and Lesotho due to declining revenue. Between this year and last, the average value of diamonds for export from the Letseng mine fell from \$3,052 per carat to \$2,133. Protest Addressing Violence against Women and Children

Hundreds of women marched from the 'Manthabiseng National Convention Centre to the Moshoeshoe I Statue Park in Maseru to present a petition to Prime Minister Thabane calling upon the government to increase efforts to address violence against women and children. Speaking on behalf of the protesters, rights activist Lineo Khalema and politician Masetota Leshota, urged the government to introduce laws that protect women and called for the establishment of more safe-houses for victims of abuse. Prime Minister Thabane told the women that the coalition government would include the protesters' grievances in its policy formulation. LCD to Hold Countrywide 'Thank You' Rallies

The Lesotho Congress for Democracy (LCD) planned a countrywide campaign aimed at thanking the electorate for supporting the party in the May 26 general election. After the elections, the LCD, All Basotho Convention (ABC) and Basotho National Party (BNP) formed a coalition government, with ABC leader Mr. Thomas Thabane being appointed Prime Minister, while LCD leader, Mr. Mothetjoa Metsing is the Deputy Prime Minister. The rallies are scheduled to begin on September 2 in Leribe and run through December. Subsequent rallies will be held in Mohale's Hoek, Qacha's Nek, Maseru, Mokhotlong, Thaba-Tseka, Butha-Buthe, Quthing, Berea, and Mafeteng. Lesotho: Time to End Ban on Women Chiefs in Lesotho

In a landmark case on August 27th and 28th, the Lesotho Constitutional Court will hear arguments in a discrimination case challenging legislation (section 10(2) of the Chieftainship Act) that allegedly permits only men to become chiefs. The case was brought by Senate Masupha - the first-born child of a chief. She is arguing that if section 10(2) of the Chieftainship Act is interpreted to only provide for male succession to chieftainship then it violates her rights to equality and freedom from discrimination under the Lesotho Constitution. The respondents argue that section 10(2) clearly prohibits women from succeeding to the chieftainship as it provides for the "first born or only son." The Southern Africa Litigation Centre (SALC) intervened in the matter as amicus curiae and argues that section 10(2), if interpreted to deny women the ability to succeed to chieftainship, violates the Lesotho Constitution as well as Lesotho's international and regional obligations, including the rights to be free from discrimination and equality. Government Holds Memorial Service for Late Miners

Four Lesotho nationals were among the 34 miners shot dead by the South African police during a labor protest at a South African platinum mine on August 16. Foreign Aid Successes

Moeketsi Monamela, a coffin maker in Maseru, Lesotho, says his business is way down, partly because of fewer AIDS deaths. In his July 7, 2012, article in The New York Times, The Coffin-Maker Benchmark, Nicholas D. Kristof stated that foreign aid has had a positive impact in Southern Africa, as indicated by the declining business of the coffin makers. The article quoted Maseru coffin maker Monamela who stated that, "Before, a lot of people were dying of AIDS. Now there is medication, so fewer people are dying of AIDS." Kristof's article discusses the importance of foreign aid and how assistance has changed the course of the AIDS epidemic in Lesotho and Malawi. 
