Kaofela rea tsoana: We are all the same

It all began in 2009, when I visited Lesotho for the first time. I was a student at Wittenberg University, and I had often heard about the life-changing trip to Lesotho led by Professor Scott Rosenberg. So, I had to go. Little did I know, that month of volunteering

would change my life forever, and send me on a path I never imagined.

After a month of building houses for orphans, constructing playgrounds and planting fruit trees, I returned home to a new world. I saw life so differently, and felt compelled to stay connected to Lesotho in some way. So, in the spring of 2010, a group of students and alumni from Wittenberg joined me and started Bloom Africa.

Bloom Africa's vision is to work with our Basotho partners to establish Community Learning Centers that empower orphans and vulnerable children with educational programming and sustainable life skills training. Bloom is operated on a volunteer basis by a team of over 15 young adults around the United States. Over the last several years, Bloom has completed numerous projects in Lesotho that benefit orphans and at-risk children. We want to help plant the seeds of hope for those who may feel hopeless. We believe that our Basotho partners have the power and ability to succeed, and we simply want to help ignite their passions and hope for life.

Today, Bloom Africa's first Community Learning Center is in Roma, where a group of Wittenberg University students first constructed the Community Center in 2008. There are over 350 children who use the Center annually. On the wall, the phrase "kaofela rea tsoana" is painted, meaning "we are all the same." We truly believe this to be true, and use this phrase to remind us how we are connected to our friends and partners in Lesotho. The Center has a classroom, computer lab, library, and craft room. There is also a playground on the premises that allow the children from the community to play safely. Our hope is to develop Community Learning Centers all around Lesotho that empower orphans and the communities in which they live.

Your Donations at Work

Thanks to the donations of many members and friends, Friends of Lesotho has been able to provide funding for several worthy projects over the last few months. When individuals or organizations submit requests for funding to FOL, the requests are researched by the FOL Donations Committee. The Committee then makes a recommendation to the Board of Directors which makes the final decision about funding. Here is a brief summary of projects recently funded by FOL.

Caitlin Fisher, a PCV in the Butha Butha district, is working with her community to build a library and create literacy programs in the area in which she serves. FOL contributed to her project, which is now fully funded and in progress.

The **Lesotho Connection** is raising funds to construct a new building for the St. Camillus HIV/AIDS Centre in the Mohales Hoek area. The Centre provides a number of valuable services such as training for home-based HIV-AIDS health care workers, temporary housing for orphans and vulnerable children, training to help families implement income generating projects, and other services that help improve health and nutrition in the community. FOL contributed to the construction of the new Centre.

Qholaqhoe Mountain Connections (QMC) is a community based organization in the rural area of Qholaqhoe in the Butha Buthe district. QMC was founded by RPCV Lynn Minderman. Its goal is to provide educational support to children whose families have been affected by HIV-AIDS and to help develop sustainable agricultural practices. QMC projects include a garden tended by villagers and orphans that provides food for orphans. They also built a water storage system for the garden. QMC also developed a laying-hen project to produce eggs that are sold to provide income for grandmothers caring for orphans. FOL has provided support for QMC projects in the past and this year contributed funds to help build a shelter to house several orphans.

Since it was founded more than twenty-five years ago FOL has provided tuition support to students in Lesotho through the **Tuition Assistance Project**. A committee made up of PC Volunteers and Staff in Lesotho identifies students in need of support and FOL provides scholarships to pay tuition. FOL continues this support and will be providing scholarships to 100 students this year.

This is an impressive list of projects supported by the generous contributions from FOL members and friends. Your donations make a real difference in the lives of many people.

The Mountain School, a book by Greg Alder


I've been working on a book, <u>The Mountain School</u>, about my years (2004-2007) in Ts'oeneng in Maseru district, and I have great news: It's just been published! I'm really excited about it. Other volunteers are responding positively

to it, and I think prospective Lesotho PCVs would enjoy it too. You can have a look at it on Amazon.com or on my website (www.gregalder.com).

Here's the synopsis from the book's back cover:

The Kingdom of Lesotho is a mountainous enclave in southern Africa, and like mountain zones throughout the world it is isolated, steeped in tradition, and home to few outsiders. The people, known as Basotho, are respected in the area as the only tribe never to be defeated by European colonizers.

Greg Alder arrives in Tšoeneng as the village's first foreign resident since 1966. In that year, the Canadian priest who had been living there was robbed and murdered in his quarters. Set up as a Peace Corps teacher at the village's secondary school, Alder finds himself incompetent in so many unexpected ways. How do you keep warm in this place where it snows but there is no electricity? For how long can dinners of cornmeal and leaves sustain you? Tšoeneng is a world apart from his home in America, but he persists in becoming familiar with the new lifestyle. He learns to speak the strange local tongue and is eventually invited to participate in initiation rites. Yet even as he seems accepted into the Tšoeneng fold, he sees how much of an outsider he will always remain — and perhaps want to remain.





Goat Curry & Papa Recipe

A Nigerian recipe with a touch of Lesotho

Submitted by Rick Ernst (Abuti Thabo), Quthing '97 - '99.

Ingredients:

2 lbs dice, fried goat meat

8 ounces fresh scotch bonnet chilies

2 lbs fresh tomatoes, ground

2 large onions, ground

2 cloves garlic

1 small tin tomato purée

1 tsp thyme

2 onions, sliced

1 tsp curry powder

2 ½ c groundnut oil

2 tsp chopped partminger leaves (Bitter Leaf) (this is an herb in the basil family, African blue basil — substitute Thai holy basil if not available)

salt to taste

Nigerian Goat Stew Preparation:

Season the goat pieces with salt then add to a pot along with the onions, thyme and curry powder and cook in a little oil for some 35 minutes, until tender (stir frequently). Grind the 2 large onions, chilies and tomatoes together in a food processor. Add the remaining oil to a separate pot and fry the ground tomato blend in this for 20 minutes, until fairly dry. Add the tomato purée and a little stock. Stir thoroughly, then add to the fried goat pieces. Bring to the boil, and then simmer gently for a further 10 minutes, stirring frequently. Drain off any oil that rises to the surface and then stir-in the partminger (or holy basil) leaves.



Place the stew on top of some fresh papa and ENJOY!

Giving Back

This past winter I took 32 college students from Wittenberg University in Ohio on a three-week service learning trip to Lesotho. Our first project was to work with Habitat for Humanity to build two houses for orphan headed homes near Matsieng. Our next project took us to Nazareth where we worked at a school with PCV Heather Mangan. We painted a library, two murals, and planted about 20 trees there. Afterwards, we went to Ramabanta where we built a pre-school and a piggery. Our last few projects included planting fruit trees and building a playground - both at an orphanage in Mazenod and at RPCV Hannah Campbell's school near Matsieng. We also had a chance to build a greenhouse in Ha Abia and do some small projects with Kick4Life in Maseru. Another group of students is hoping to visit in June 2014 and complete additional projects.

St. Michael's School Library

My husband, Mike Skinner, and I arrived in Mokhotlong in the mountains of Lesotho as Bahá'í volunteers in June 2011. We started work there by offering to do 'Breezes of Confirmation' (a Bahá'í-inspired educational programme for junior youth – 11-14 year-olds) in the high school close to where we were staying.



In the meantime, the wife of the headmaster who is also a school principal at St. Michael's Primary School found out about us and through a mutual friend asked us to go and help at her school. We started doing 'Breezes' and teaching English and music at St. Michael's. We soon discovered that the standard of English was very poor: Grade 4 could not understand a single word we said! Starting with a picture book, we started communicating with the



So, the idea to collect books was born. After putting out an appeal, a friend in England decided to collect books and, amazingly, discovered a charity in his home-town called Book-Cycle which exports second-hand books to Africa! In no time 1500 books were collected and the interfaith group that the friend, Ravindra Nathwani, was attending offered to pay for the shipping!

The first consignment of books (another's on its way at the time of writing) arrived in February 2012. My sister's company got them imported into South Africa and she personally drove two car-loads close to Lesotho. I managed to make a pre-dawn trip from Mokhotlong with a local truck-driver, Matjiea Nkune, who takes wool down from the mountains to South Africa through the notorious Sani Pass. And so, on the return journey, the books arrived in Lesotho on top of 85 sacks of maize meal!

The school had given an old chicken-shed to be made into a library and Mike spent hours painting, repainting, damp-proofing and doing various other things in order to make the building reasonable. FOL kindly gave funds so that shelves could be made locally and some carpet and curtains could be purchased. This made storage of the books so much easier and clearer (before they were put on benches but kept falling off!) and the library became a comfortable, pleasant space to work in.

During this time, Liabeng Ntsiki was helping with sorting, cataloguing etc. and then started working with classes of children in the library. In January of this year she attended a two-week training course for librarians at the national library in Maseru, even struggling back with a box of donated books on the bus!

Liabeng has been such a wonderful volunteer in many ways and due to the generosity of three friends in the UK and Germany, she now receives a small stipend. She and other volunteers work with classes of students in the library. This ranges from teaching the alphabet and its sounds with colorful picture books to grade 1 to helping slow learners in upper classes improve



comprehension and composition skills. The improvement in the slow learners' ability has been excellent and we realized that they are just students who have not had the chance to learn English well. It's wonderful to see the confidence and joy that the program is giving these 'slow



Future plans include increasing the number of volunteers to listen to children reading, starting a reading program with grade 3 and electrifying the building so that classes can be done in the evenings with herdboys, computers can be installed for easy communication with primary schools in USA and UK and the library catalogue can be maintained effectively.

Lesotho Must Increase Citizen Participation

Motlamelle Anthony Kapa, Head of the Department of Political and Administrative Studies at the National University of Lesotho, recently published a report that praises the country for its recent record of political stability, but urges the Lesotho parliament to repeal laws that restrict citizens' participation in political processes and to pass new legislation that will increase citizens' rights. Specifically, the report calls for the repeal of the Public Procession Act, which restricts citizens' right of freedom of association; urges the government to pass an Access to Information law; seeks transformation of state run media to a public broadcaster, which would provide all political parties equal access to media; and urges passing of the Human Rights Commission Bill, which will help to promote and protect the fundamental rights of all Basotho.

Lesotho Court Denies Woman Right to Inherit Chieftainship

Lesotho's Constitutional Court recently upheld the section of the Chieftainship Act which denies daughters the right to succeed to chieftainship. In *Masupha v. The Senior Resident Magistrate for the Subordinate Court of Berea and Others*, Senate Masupha, the first-born child of a chief sought to succeed to the chieftainship. However, she was denied the right to succeed based on her gender. Customary law in Lesotho provides that wives can become "caretakers" of the chieftainship until a male heir takes over, or if their chief husbands become ill or die, but women cannot inherit the role or succeed to chieftainship. The parties now have the right to appeal the decision to the Court of Appeal.

The decision is contrary to the trend in neighboring countries such as South Africa, Botswana, Tanzania, Ghana, and Kenya to strike down laws that deny women the right to inherit or succeed to chieftainship. Lesotho to Expand HIV and Tuberculosis Programs

The Global Fund to Fight AIDS, Tuberculosis and Malaria recently signed agreements with the Ministry of Finance of Lesotho totaling \$17 million to allow Lesotho to expand prevention and treatment of HIV and multidrug resistant tuberculosis (MDR-TB).

Dr. Pinkie Rosemary Manamolela, Minister of Health, stated that "The HIV grant signed today will target most vulnerable populations such as women and girls, people living with HIV, and youth out of school, in order to reduce the incidence of new infections and increase universal access to HIV counseling and testing services."

The Tuberculosis grant will seek to address MDR/XDR-TB, TB/HIV co-infection, expand high quality TB treatment (DOTs), and engage communities in TB control. The Global Fund has disbursed \$123 million to support the fight against HIV and TB in Lesotho since 2003 and is the main financer of second line TB treatment in Lesotho.

Zuma agrees to fund Lesotho power plant

President Jacob Zuma of South Africa recently agreed finance a new dam in Lesotho to boost electricity supplies to both countries. South Africa and Lesotho originally signed a treaty in 1986 for the first phase of the Lesotho Highlands Water Project, which included the construction of Katse and Mohale dams. The agreement also included the construction of the Muela hydroelectric power station in Butha-Buthe and a power station at Kobong.

Following the agreement, the South African government decided not to build the second plant. However, after recent talks, South Africa agreed to build the second hydroelectric power station. Under the new agreement, the plant will not be constructed at Kobong but at Muela, Butha-Buthe. A tunnel will join Polihali to Muela to deliver water to drive the power plant before the water is re-channelled to Katse Dam for delivery to South Africa.

The new power plant at Muela will cover Lesotho's power deficit (estimated at between 170MW and 200MW), leaving the bulk of the power generated for Lesotho to sell to South Africa. Construction is scheduled for 2018 and will be executed by the Lesotho Highlands Development Authority, which is directly under the Lesotho government's control.


