A Heritage Route for Novelist Thomas Mofolo



Friends of Lesotho made a modest grant to enable the Morija Museum and Archives to begin work to create a Heritage Trail to honor the work of Lesotho's first novelist, Thomas Mofolo (1876-1948). Not only was Mofolo the country's first novelist, he was also the first African novelist. His creative output between 1906 and 1910, while Mofolo worked at Morija, left an enduring legacy not only for Basotho but also for African and world communities.

At an International Conference on Thomas Mofolo held at the National University of Lesotho in March, 2015, Stephen Gill, Curator of Morija Museum & Archives, delivered a 32page paper, entitled "Thomas Mofolo: The Man, the Writer and his Contexts." In this paper, Gill broke new ground regarding Mofolo's family and influences that helped shape his thinking and writing.

In order to lay groundwork for the heritage trail, Gill and the last surviving child of Thomas Mofolo, 'M'e 'Mapheko (now 82 years of age), will visit key sites in 2015 and 2016. These include Botheta (near Zastron in the Free State, where written records of the Mofolo family first appear during the mid-1800s); the Hermon area in Mafeteng District, Masitise, Oomogomong, and other places in Quthing, where the family lived; T.Y. (Teya-Teyaneng), where Mofolo lived from 1910 until his death in 1948; Bokong near Katse Dam, where one of Mofolo's trading stores was located, etc. A recent acquisition of aerial footage of Lesotho from the 1950s to the present will enable Gill to see what some of the specific locations looked like in their heyday.

projects. FOL has also found ways to make an impact in Lesotho, such as helping support an orphan feeding program in Ramabanta and supporting research being conducted by the Morija Museum and Archive about the life of writer Thomas Mofolo.

On a more personal note, I look forward to taking 20-plus Wittenberg University students from Ohio to Lesotho for three weeks from December 17 to January 8 to work on projects designed to help orphans and other vulnerable children. We will be building a house as well as repairing several older ones. We will build a playground at a pre-school and an elementary school as well as plant fruit trees and make gardens. A dozen Wittenberg students will continue a project that will provide food and nutritional supplement to 3,000 children in Mokhotlong.

At the end of the year, FOL will seek new members to join our Board of Directors, so if you are curious or interested, please contact me through the FOL web site. I particularly hope some newly-returned RPCVs will consider joining, as your recent experience in Lesotho is invaluable.



Zoë Wicomb's complex and deeply evocative fiction, including *You Can't Get Lost in Cape Town* (2000) and *October* (2014), is among the most distinguished works of South African women's literature. Wicomb's books are also among the only works of fiction to explore the experience of "Coloured" citizens in apartheid-era South Africa, whose mixed heritage traps them, as Bharati Mukherjee wrote in the New York Times, "in the racial crucible of their country." The *Wall St. Journal* opined, "Wicomb deserves a wide American audience, on a par with Nadine Gordimer and J.M.Coetzee."

A lot of work gets done behind the scenes in Friends of Lesotho, not the least of which is that done by the Membership Committee. Their work is focused on a couple of areas.

Poor Quality Education is Not Cheap

An African Economic Outlook (AEO) 2015 Lesotho Report, Free Primary Education (FPE), indicated primary school enrollment rates since 2004 were above 80%. Enrollment in secondary schools increased from 19.2% in 2000 to 36.5 percent in 2012. The report indicated that Lesotho allocated 36.4% of education expenditure to higher education, 36% for secondary education, 20.5% for primary education, and less than 1% for Early Childhood Care and Development.

In 2009, 10,180 candidates sat for the Cambridge Overseas School Certificate examinations (COSC): 5,789 obtained a School Certificate; 584 obtained a first class pass and 1,823 passed in the second class division. In 2013 the numbers increased and 13,311 candidates sat for the COSC: 7,583 obtained a School Certificate; 734 candidates obtained a first class pass and 2,440 obtained a second class pass.

Based on these numbers, more students were admitted to National University of Lesotho (NUL). However, due to lack of funds, of the 2,211 students admitted to NUL for the 2015/2016 academic year, only 1,628 students were approved for scholarships. Tuition fees for a degree program at NUL for the 2014/2015 academic year were M14,961.50 (approx \$1,080).

South Africa's Water Needs Increase

Due to drought and the impact of climate change in provinces including Free State and KwaZulu-Natal, the feeding area for the Lesotho Highlands Water Project has increased beyond its original scope of supplying the industrial Gauteng Province. Due to increased demand, contactors are expected to speed up implementation of the project's second phase, and the Department of Water and Sanitation accordingly granted recent approval for the release of water from Lesotho to Free State municipalities.

Allegations of Corruption by King's Friend

Masupha Sole, who served nine years in jail for corruption in the Lesotho Highlands Water Project, is again facing allegations of corruption. After his release from prison in 2011, Sole was reappointed as adviser to the scheme despite objections from South Africa. The current allegations relate to a R1.6-million salary he received as an advisor between September 2014 and January 2015.

Commission Appointed to Investigate Killing of Mahao

Former army chief, General Maaparankoe Mahao, was shot on June 25, 2015, and an independent commission of inquiry was appointed by regional leaders to investigate the killing. The commission is headed by Botswana High Court Judge Mpaphi Phumaphi and has 12 other members. The government of Prime Minister Pakalitha Mosisili claims Mahao was shot by soldiers while resisting arrest for his alleged complicity in a coup plot. The opposition asserts that he was murdered.

Torture Allegations

The Southern Africa Litigation Centre (SALC) has raised concerns about allegations of torture of detained soldiers arrested in connection with coup plot allegations.

Habeas corpus applications submitted to the courts by relatives of the detained soldiers asserted that they had been taken by armed, masked men to a place where they were tortured. Allegations of intimidation of attorneys and the judiciary were also contained in the SALC report.

On Monday, July 13, there was a mass stay-away to protest human rights abuses. Concerns regarding lack of due process were also purported to have been raised at the Southern African Development Community (SADC) heads of state and government summit in Gaborone in August.

RPCV Oral History Archives Wants Interviewers

RPCVs interviewing RPCVs? That's exactly what the RPCV Oral History Archives Project does. Who can get an RPCV's story better than another Volunteer? Would you like to become an interviewer?

Over 400 in-depth interviews, ranging from one to three hours in length, are stored at the John F. Kennedy Presidential Library. As part of the National Archives, the interviews are in the public domain. The project began in 1999 when Bob Klein, a member of Ghana 1 — the first group of PCVs to begin work overseas — decided to interview members of his group. Since then, about 400 RPCVs have been interviewed.

Two other reporters, Motsamai John Talla of Harvest FM and Puseletso Ramokhethi of People's Choice FM Radio also fled the country. MISA Lesotho is working to facilitate their safe return.

Conz Researches Lesotho's Agricultural History

Chris Conz, RPCV 2007-09 in Qachas Nek, Ha Makhaola, returned this summer 2015 from a nine-month research stay in Lesotho, supported by a Fulbright grant. He spent time in






December 10th Deadline Libraries for Lesotho
