
Friends of Lesotho Annual Report 2018





Lumelang Motsoelle,

I am happy to state that 2018 was a very positive year for FOL. I believe that much of our continued success comes from our dedicated board and committee members as well as the many individuals who support and partner with FOL. FOL has continued to search for new ways to make a meaningful difference in the lives of the Basotho. I think I speak for all of us when I state that FOL is a labor of love, for a people and country that has become part of our lives. Serving as President of FOL has allowed me to work with a wonderful group of people as well as allowing me to stay connected to Lesotho through the volunteers we support and the Basotho who seek FOL out. I am proud that FOL has developed a strong reputation in the diaspora, and that people seeking answers about Lesotho, or help with projects often turn to us. As those who care about Lesotho looked for ways to help, many turned to FOL for guidance, and trusted FOL to make the most impactful and cost-effective use of their donations. I feel that level of trust from the community is proof of the hard work that our board members have put in. We have been fortunate to continue to help children and orphans in Lesotho through our continuing partnerships such as the TAP program that provides scholarships for Basotho students to attend High School (we supplied a near record \$17,000 in scholarships), as well as our continued support of volunteer projects through the Peace Corps Partnership Program. This year we were able to fund more PCPP requests than ever; supporting 9 PCPP projects ranging from school roof projects, to others helping to build and repair libraries and classrooms. In total, FOL was able to send over \$25,000 dollars to support PCV requests through the PCPP program. Furthermore, we have been able to help vulnerable children in Lesotho through donations to the Wittenberg projects, and helping feed and clothe children in Roma and Ramabanta in partnership with Springfield Rotary and Bloom Africa. That partnership has also allowed us to support the Leratong Community center which provides programming and meals to over 150 children in Roma. In the process of continuing to expand our engagement with Lesotho, FOL was able to help the Lesotho Nutrition Initiative ship 240,000 meals containing nutritional supplements to children in Lesotho suffering from severe malnutrition and stunting. We were proud to be able to help the Queen Street Baptist Church get funds to the Little Angels Daycare in Thaba-Bosiu started by RPCV Rose Paradise. We have also developed a relationship with RISE project and helped fund the construction of a new building at the God's Love Centre.

FOL continues to maintain a good relationship with the Lesotho Embassy located in Washington D.C. As part of our continuing effort to keep as many RPCVs engaged in FOL as possible we made membership to FOL free, and have increased our efforts to provide our members updates through email. This year we held two successful crowd funding events: the first to raise money for back to school projects in Lesotho and the second to help raise funds for Phelisanong Children's Center. Through the generous support of FOL members and the larger community we were able to exceed our goal of \$5,000 in both cases. This kind of new fundraising initiative will help FOL to continue to support a wide-variety of projects. Getting recently returned volunteers on the board helps keep FOL in touch with issues in Lesotho as well as bringing new and vibrant leadership to the organization. As I start my tenth on the board and sixth year as president, I would like to take this opportunity to once again thank board member Richard Rowan for all of his hard work and willingness to step in where ever he is needed. Furthermore, I am not sure where we would be without John Hollister. I would like to say what a pleasure it is for me that two of my former students (Megan White) who travelled to Lesotho with me in 2013 and Justin Unternaher who traveled with me in 2017 will both be serving as a PCV in Lesotho this year.

I would also like to thank Country the whole Peace Corps Lesotho office staff, especially, Ntate Clement and Me' Ntsopa for all of their help. After serving his country as its Ambassador to the United States for the last six-years, Ambassador Sebatane returned home to Lesotho, he will be missed by all of us at FOL. As the spouse of an RPCV (Lois Sebatane) the Ambassador forged a special relationship with FOL. We are looking forward to establishing an equally supportive relationship with Ambassador Maja, who also has ties to PCL. On a personal note, I was thrilled that a number of RPCVs and members of FOL were able to join me at a dinner with His Majesty, King Letsie III at Wittenberg last May before he gave the University's commencement address. Lastly, I would our members who make it possible for us to do the work we are able to do. I also appreciate the trust that you place in us, and allow us to be your voice in Lesotho.

FOL accomplishes its mission and purpose by:

- Ensuring good governance of the organization with fiscal responsibility
- Keeping members and friends up to date on news about Lesotho via a quarterly newsletter, website and other social media resources
- Providing members and friends with information on the needs of the people of Lesotho and opportunities for support
- Conducting annual appeals for donations along with a variety of fundraising activities
- Providing direct assistance to worthy projects (i.e. orphan care, HIV/AIDS education, life skills training and education, business development, school repair and construction, scholarships and other needs as identified
- Providing oversight and accountability of funds sent to Lesotho
- Reporting to members and friends on the performance of the organization and accomplishments through an Annual Report.

Values

FOL values the friendship between the people of Lesotho and the U.S. FOL is comprised of both former Peace Corps Volunteers and others who have an interest in Lesotho. FOL partners with the U.S. Peace Corps Voluteers serving in Lesotho as well as other individuals and NGOs who seek our assistance and wish to cooperate on joint ventures.

FOL strives to "make a difference at the grassroots level", funding projects considered too small by major donor organizations. Project funding decisions are reviewed by the Board of Directors, following recommendations from the Donations Committee to ensure projects are worthy of funding and are adequately monitored.

FOL is affiliated with the National Peace Corps Association and has agreements to work through the U.S. Peace Corps Partnership Program in Lesotho. FOL also enters into Memoranda of Understanding (MOU) with individuals and groups sponsoring education and development projects in Lesotho.

Friends of Lesotho Inc. is a registered 501 (c)(3) organization. Contributions are tax deductible to the extent permitted by law. Friends of Lesotho Supported Projects

Friends of Lesotho (FOL) donates to projects implemented by local and international organizations and schools to benefit community members, orphans and vulnerable children and students in Lesotho. Applications for funding are submitted directly by project leaders and indirectly by Peace Corps volunteers through the Peace Corps Partnership

Project Descriptions

1. Phelisanong Children's Center

The purpose of this project was to purchase a bread oven and construct a ramp at the Phelisanong Children's Center, which serves more than 220 girls and boys with disabilities.





2. rise (Relationships Inspiring Social Enterprise)

FOL supported two projects undertaken by rise. The first project was an in loco fellowship program for 20 unemployed young Basotho graduates. FOL funded building materials and supplies for the construction of a residential center for adolescent vulnerable youth at God's Love Center Child Care Facility in Sekamaneng. The young people learned how to design and build using sustainable and community participatory methods to construct the Center. The second project funded furniture for this Center.





3. Lesotho Nutrition Initiative (LNI)

FOL supported the cost of shipping 240,000 meals to Lesotho. With the assistance of the World Food Program and Catholic Relief Services, the meals were distributed to seven centers: Touching Tiny Lives in Mokhotlong, the Leratong Community Center, Ramabanta soup kitchen, three orphanages run by the Catholic Church, and to 100 HIV positive orphans under the care of Kick-4-Life.

PCPP Project Descriptions

4. Tuition Assistance Program (TAP)









5. Local Lights Project (Mokhotlong)

This project supported the installation solar panels, lights, and outlets in a school. The main goals of this project were to improve approximately 110 students' learning and attendance, improve the teaching capacity of the school, to power the school's printer for exams and educational activities, to power the school's projector for educational videos, and to charge the school's computer for educational outreach and research. The students now go to the school to study in the morning before school and use the lights in the classrooms.

6. Local High School (Quthing)

The Local Secondary School is the only post-primary school in the area but does not include grades 11 and 12. Students who wish to complete their high school education must attend a boarding school in the district capital, more than 50km away. The purpose of this grant was to support the construction of an additional classroom, which would allow the Secondary School to become a High School by providing space for grades 11 and 12. Approximately, 110 students will benefit from the construction of the new classroom.

7. Toilets R 4 Us (Leribe)

A local high school serves as the center of the community, often hosting large community events, which the school facility cannot support. The purpose of this project was to construct more toilets to be able to accommodate large groups of people, allow students to compete with the other neighboring schools, allow the to increase student enrollment. An estimated 1,355 students, 865 service providers and 1,675 community members will directly or indirectly benefit from this project.



8. Rhino Library and Resource Center (Qacha's Nek)

The purpose of this project was to meet increased enrollment and enhance teaching and learning at a high school by building a library and a computer room and purchase extra science laboratory equipment. Approximately, 640 students and 24 teachers will benefit from these additional facilities.

9. Primary School Triple C (Botha-Bothe)

Although there are several structures at the Primary School Triple C, there is nowhere suitable for the children to sit while outside other than on the dirt or in the weeds. The purpose of this project is to build a seating structure to enable students to sit together as a class to work on lessons and homework, study for tests, and eat lunch. One wall will have a chalkboard for an outside classroom. It is anticipated that the project will directly and indirectly benefit 355 students and community members.

10. Primary School Roof Renovation (Leribe)

The purpose of the project was to renovate two classrooms of a school whose roofs were blown away by strong winds. This project will benefit 380 students and 40 teachers.

11. Life-Changing Renovation Project (Qacha's Nek)

The purpose of this project was to renovate a science laboratory and library at a large local high school. The goal is to increase interest and aptitude in science and math, allow students to practice research skills, establish a reading culture, increase student access to health literature and resources, and preserve the history of the school for future generations. The project allowed the school to patch leaky roofs, re-paint walls, repair the lab's sinks and plumbing system, install new doors, and build new shelves for the library. It is estimated that 830 students will benefit from this project.



12. Pre-school project (Mohale's Hoek)

The purpose of the Library Project is to provide easy access to books for young students at a pre-school by building small book shelves with wheels in each classroom and providing a literacy workshop for teachers. The goal is to increase reading and writing and foster a joy of reading among students. It is estimated and 450 students and 330 community members will benefit from this project.

13. Camp STEAM (Mohale's Hoek)

This project supported a Camp STEAM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Art, Mathematics), a Ministry of Education and Peace Corps partnered program that provides a fun, safe, and hands-on learning atmosphere for students in the form of a camp. The camp encourages students in self-discovery, logical reasoning, personal empowerment in their personal, academic, and professional lives, confidence building, critical thinking, self-expression, and gender equality in both sexes. The camp also aims to build capacity with host-country partners from the Lesotho Math & Science Teachers Association (LMSTA), Ministry of Education (MOET), Vodacom, Lesotho Highlands Development Association, Ministry of Water. Eighty-seven students and 12 service providers benefited from the camp.

14. Local High School World Map and Projector (Mohale's Hoek)


The purpose of this project was to provide local high school with a projector to use to disseminate information in the classroom, staff meetings, and community events, and to paint a world map on the campus. The goal was to contribute in teaching students, especially young female students, about other cultures of the world and geography, and to serve as a point of reference for reading storybooks, playing games, and learning about the lifestyle of people in other countries and cultures. Nearly 300 students and community members benefited from this project.



How to Apply for Funding From FOL

The Donations Committee reviews all applications for funding to the organization. The Committee meets the third Sunday of every even numbered month (February, April, June, etc.) and makes recommendations at the following month's meeting of the FOL Board for action. FOL now has members from almost every state and from abroad. The volunteer board of directors and committee members guide the organization's activities by meeting regularly via teleconference. An annual meeting is also conducted in March via teleconference.


FOL Goals


