This year our speakers included Dan Kobayashi, an African analyst for the State Department and Thabo Mosoeunyane, a senior project officer with the United Nation Development Programme in Maseru. Both speakers provided tremendous insight into the current political climate in Lesotho, the current political situation leading up to this year's elections and the ongoing impact of COVID on the nation. Both speakers were very knowledgeable and informative and were gracious enough to answer all the questions members had for them.

At the meeting we also elected three new members: Thomas Lindner who served in Leribe from 2014-15 (and who will be taking over as our new treasurer), Kenneth Tucceri, who served in Thaba Tseka from 2017 to 2019 and Kathryn Larimore who also served in Thaba Tseka from 2017 to 2019. I would also like to thank all of the members who choose to return to the Board, all of whom were re-elected (Kevin Freer, Cayla Anderson, Danielle Sharp and Meghan White).

I just returned from Lesotho on March 11th after a ten-day visit to the mountain kingdom. The three years away from Lesotho was the longest I had been away since the early 1990s and I was so happy to get to return. Perhaps the most startling thing was how green Lesotho was and how much it rained during my visit. After all these years of drought, the rain is welcome, however it has rained so much that many fields are under water which is threatening this year's harvest. This June fellow Board member Ali Kukovich and I will be returning to Lesotho for 3 weeks, as she will be joining a group of Wittenberg University students that I am taking to Lesotho to do service projects in Ramabanta and Sebiting.

In some very exciting news, according to the Peace Corps website volunteers will be returning to Lesotho in September! Lastly, I would like to thank Marty Smith who spent the last ten years serving as the webmaster for FOL and outgoing treasurers Rory Pulvino and Rachel Edmunds for their service and dedication to FOL.

FOL Fundraising Committee

The FOL Fundraising Committee's task is to devise and implement activities to raise financial resources that the organization can channel into locally initiated projects in Lesotho.

At present, our fundraising activities mainly concentrate on an end-of-year appeal, as well as one crowd-funding campaign per year. We would like to increase our donation receipts, however, and are looking for new members with fresh ideas. You do not need previous fundraising experience.

Our committee meets about every two months by Zoom, generally one or two weeks before regular board meetings. Inbetween meetings, we communicate via email or phone, as needed.

FOL Membership Committee

The Membership Committee's tasks are to maintain membership records. The committee also engages in outreach activities to encourage interested people to join FOL. For instance, the committee develops programs to let new Peace Corps Volunteers know about FOL and how FOL can help them during their service in Lesotho. The Committee also reaches out to newly returned Peace Corps Volunteers to encourage them to remain involved with Lesotho by joining FOL.

The committee sends out donation receipt letters, helps RPCV groups that are organizing reunions and other gatherings to contact those who might be interested in attending those events. It also produces end of year reports for the FOL Annual Report.

FOL uses a Microsoft Access database. Normal use of the database does not require a high degree of expertise, but the committee would love to have someone who has some knowledge of Microsoft Access to join the committee. However, most membership committee activities do not require the use of the database.

The committee meets about every two months by Zoom. In-between meetings we communicate by email or phone as needed. We anticipate that working on the committee would require about 1 hour/month, although occasionally a little more time might be needed when producing membership reports for the FOL Annual Report and when entering data after FOL fundraising campaigns. Maluti Adventist Hospital \$2,000



Maluti Adventist Hospital

Maluti Adventist Hospital located in Mapoteng, Lesotho, is one of two district hospitals in Berea, serving a population of 100,000 people. Maluti Adventist Hospital has hosted a number of Peace Corps Volunteers over the years. In response to the COVID-19 pandemic, funding was provided to the hospital to create a six-patient intensive care unit. The hospital did not previously have an ICU, so patients requiring ICU care had to be transferred to Maseru, a one-and-a-half-hour drive. When the

ICU was created, funds were not provided to upgrade the existing hospital beds in the ICU wing. The beds are very basic, lacking electric controls for raising and lowering the bed and positioning the patient based on clinical needs. Lesotho has one of the lowest ratios of nurses to population in the world, so easing their workload is vital.

The goal is to purchase five (5) of the five-function electric beds needed for the ICU at Maluti Adventist Hospital. FOL will donate funds for one of these beds. FOL will host a "donate" button/webpage on our website and Facebook page that can be used by donors to further support the ICU bed project.

Wittenberg Community Project \$3,000

Partnering with Habitat for Humanity Lesotho, the Wittenberg Community Project volunteers will be building one house in Ramabanta for an Orphan Headed household. While in Ramabanta, volunteers will also be working on a community center built by previous trips that includes painting and adding shelving. The center serves roughly 40-60 children daily. The community center provides meals and activities for children in the community.

Wittenberg volunteers will spend the next 14 days working in the area around Molimo N'Thuse Lodge. The projects in this community were brought to Wittenberg through Mme Mamothe (former APCD for PCL) in conjunction with the chief and members of the VDC. The first project is to build a new building

which will house the community kindergarten (the current one barely qualifies as a structure) which will improve the atmosphere and safety of younger learners. Volunteers will also be repairing an old run-down building to serve as a center for local crafts and businesses. One of the rooms will be used by local weavers to make, store and sell their product to travelers headed up to the lodge. The second room will be used as an office for local pony trekking. The building will be painted to let travelers know that these services are located here. Both of these projects will help bring money into the community. Lastly, if time allows the Wittenberg volunteers will do educational painting at the local primary school.

Hello FOL Members,


In the last FOL board meeting I was voted in as treasurer.

I served as a PCV in Lesotho from 2014 to 2016, teaching Math at Makhobalo High School in Ha Khabo, Leribe.

The picture on the right was taken at the end of my service when the staff gave me a Lesotho T-shirt for my farewell. It shows me and my counterpart, M'e Sepanya Molefi. She teaches Development Studies and was key to welcoming me in as part of the staff at Makhobalo. In return she became a strong partner for the Peace Corps and the PCV who replaced me. The image says more than words that we had become friends and that we interacted at eye-level. We are still in regular contact, just the other day she sent me pictures of a Grassroots Soccer refresher camp, where she participated, which means when PC service resumes she will be there and ready to engage.

In a previous life I worked for Hewlett Packard in Corvallis, Oregon. Born and raised in Germany I once was a scientist at a Max-Planck Institute in Berlin. I stood on the Berlin Wall the day it came down, and I know what "Ich bin ein Berliner" means. There is a line of sight to serving in the Peace Corps and being sworn in next to the image of JFK was a great day for me.

During my time in Ha Khabo I saw an opportunity in planting quinoa on the school fields at Makhobalo. Serendipity had it that I had become friends with an executive at Care for Basotho Associates who also had an interest in pursuing this idea. After suc-



Also during my service I saw postings on Facebook from "Africa's Tomorrow" and in 2018 I reached out to the teachers to select a student for this program. At this point I want to acknowledge the leadership of the principal, Ntate Kita, who had also been instrumental in making my service an overall positive experience. The selection committee picked a student who then was accepted into Africa's Tomorrow in 2019. Again, Covid has placed constraints on the plan but the student is currently attending Lerotholi Polytechnic in Maseru.

New US Ambassador Brewer Speaks Out In First Interview

Maria Brewer, the new US Ambassador to Lesotho was recently interviewed by Lesotho Times Editor Herbert Moyo and Deputy Editor Silence Charumbira.

She discussed three projects under the Millennium Challenge Corporation (MCC) compact II: the health systems strengthening project, the market-driven irrigated horticulture project, and the business environment and technical assistance project. She noted that the projects have been designed with sustainability in mind.

She further noted that the United States Government has consistently stressed the importance of meaningful trafficking in persons (TIP) investigations, including those involving high-ranking officials, and the importance of meaningful action against gender-based violence.

Regarding the increase in homicides in Lesotho, she noted that the US signed a Memorandum of Cooperation with the Minister of Police and Public Safety late last year to assist in building more professional, capable, and accountable security services and to help address the high crime rate in the country. She also noted that Lesotho's growing partnership with the FBI is an example of how the Government seeks to close the capability gaps among law enforcement personnel. One of the main gaps we have observed is the capacity of law enforcement to conduct credible investigations. For example, fingerprint records were not digitized, which made it difficult for officers to identify criminals. At the request of the Lesotho Mounted Police Service (LMPS), the FBI scanned and digitized nearly 70 000 criminal fingerprint records to begin the first phase of creating a national database system. The FBI also held a FBI-led biometric investigation training course.

Regarding delayed reforms, she noted that with the omnibus bill heading to the National Assembly this week, the process appears to be moving forward. We hope that members of parliament continue to focus on issues of national interest, including adopting key reforms, and election related laws are prioritized as the country prepares for elections this fall.

Regarding AGOA and the MCC, Ambassador Brewer reported that in 2021, US\$333, 7 million worth of goods were exported to the US under AGOA. Lesotho is ranked number two in terms of value of goods exported and number three in terms of the volume of goods exported under AGOA. While there is still a lot of room for growth, this amount of trade is a great achievement. AGOA has created over 45 000 jobs in the textiles industry since its inception, even as the COVID-19 pandemic negatively impacted the sector recently.

Lesotho currently exports textiles and garments to the United States. Lesotho's main imports from the United States include machinery and optical and medical instruments.

In addition to textiles, she noted that Lesotho has the potential to export handicrafts, bottled water, canned food, fruits and vegetables, wool, mohair products, and leather products to the United States under AGOA. Mon-Tech Institute Awards Qualifications to Graduates

MON-TECH Institute has held its first graduation since the beginning of the Covid-19 pandemic with 14 students receiving diplomas in Occupational Health and Safety.

Their qualifications were recognized by the South African Qualification Authority (SAQA) which will enable them to gain admission in many higher learning institutions in South Africa. Licensing Abolished For Non-Risky Businesses

Ministry of Trade and Industry chief information officer, 'Mantletse Maile noted that certain business enterprises that previously required licensing before operating will no longer need it, due to a new law to be implemented soon. The Business Licensing and Registration Act, 2019, allows the government to use a risk-based approach in licensing businesses. Those deemed to be harmful to the public and environment will be licensed while those not considered to be posing any harm will not be licensed, just registered.

The new law is expected to speed up the process of starting a business and reduce associated costs such as license fees. Despite being enacted in 2019, implementation of the legislation was delayed as the ministry's systems were not ready to accommodate the associated changes.

Businesses that may be seen as not risky include graphic designing, dress-making, beauty parlors, media companies and supermarkets among others.

Those that are risky include establishments in the food and drinks industry such as restaurants and hotels, petroleum fuel industry businesses and medical products among others. Read more at https://lestimes.com/licensing-abolished-for-non-risky-businesses/

New Law to Protect Women's Economic Rights

The National Assembly has approved a new law aimed at economically empowering women married under customary law. Entitled the Laws of Lerotholi (Amendment) Bill, 2022, the legislation has been referred to the Senate for deliberations. If it passes the Senate, it will then go to the King for royal assent before becoming law.

Passage of the legislation is a pre-conditions of the country entering the Millennium Challenge Corporation (MCC)'s US\$300 million development compact.

The Bill would end widows being considered as minors and permit them to have "ownership and control of the property of the joint estate after the death of her husband."

Taxi Fare Hike

To avert a taxi strike, the government is considering transport operators' demands for a 30 percent fare hike.

Lesotho phases out one-size-fits-all curriculum

Although primary education is now free in Lesotho, many children drop out in middle school because their families are unable to afford school fees. However, Lesotho has been selected with other four other countries in the SADC region to champion the Education Plus Initiative, a project which will ensure free secondary education for all. Chairperson of Education Plus Initiative Technical Advisory Committee, 'Mabakubung Seutloali, said through the initiative Lesotho will, among others, offer free secondary education and review educational policies so that children are able to choose the educational stream they want to follow. Rather than just having an academic options in secondary schools, children will have freedom to choose from academic, vocational and technical streams. The Education Plus Initiative is a project supported by UN agencies including, UNAIDS, UNESCO, UNICEF, UNFPA and UN Women

The Ministry of Education has drafted policy with the help of UNFPA that will ensure that children are not expelled from school because of unintended pregnancies or unintended and early marriages. She said once passed by the Parliament, the policy will ensure that there is a re-entry route in schools for such children. The Ministry of Education will also draft a Retention Policy with the help of UNESCO. Majoro reshuffles cabinet

Prime Minister Moeketsi Majoro recently reshuffled some of his cabinet:

Moshe Leoma moved from the Ministry of Labour and Employment to Local Government,

Lehlohonolo Moramotse has moved from Local Government to Public Service,

Deputy Minister of Local Government Selemo Mangobe has become the new Minister of Labour,

'Mathabo Phafoli is the new Deputy Minister of Local Government.

FAMO gangsterism fuels HIV, drug abuse

FAMO music-related gangsterism has been linked to substance abuse and to increased risk of HIV/Aids infection.

FAMO is an accordion-based popular Sesotho music, which is associated with murderous vendettas between rival gangs, with the musicians and their followers being the victims. The country has been rocked by FAMO-related killings and violence due to a bloody turf wars among the genre's various gangs. The groups often ridicule and insult each other in their songs, resulting in violent and often fatal clashes.

In Mafeteng, FAMO gangs in the district are said to be a major contributing factor in making the Mafeteng district the highest hit in HIV infections in the country. According to a LePHIA 2020 report, Mafeteng is at 24% of HIV infections, followed by Quthing with 23.9%. A member to the local health sector said in some places where FAMO gangs are found, healthcare workers are not allowed to enter the villages to provide HIV services.

The gang members allegedly discourage HIV-positive women from taking medication, and demand that their wives be given only pregnancy and postnatal services, and not HIV services." Read more at https://publiceyenews.com/famo-gangsterism-fuels-hiv-

Basotho Embrace Covid-19 Vaccination but Find Government Assistance Lacking

More than one in three Basotho say their household lost a primary source of income because of the COVID-19 pandemic, but only about one in seven say they received pandemic-related assistance from the government. A majority of citizens say pandemic-related assistance was distributed unfairly, and most think that a lot of the resources intended for the COVID-19 response were lost to corruption.

Women of Lesotho's garment industry lose jobs, hope in COVID

Lesotho's clothing industry is the country's largest private employer, and more than 80% of its workers are women, according to government officials. In 2001, Lesotho signed on to an American trade deal: the African Growth and Opportunities Act, which guaranteed it duty-free imports to the U.S. of clothing manufactured in the country. Chinese and Taiwanese companies built factories on the industrial edges of Maseru. Today, textile products account for nearly half of Lesotho's exports.

Due to the pandemic, more than 11,000 of Lesotho's 50,000 garment workers have lost their jobs since March 2020.
