First, I want to thank our members who continue to support our work and the board members for all the hours they have put in. I am pleased to report that Friends of Lesotho (FOL) continues to fulfill its mission to promote positive change and to assist the people of Lesotho.

I have been lucky enough to visit Lesotho twice in the last few months; once, for a short two-week visit in April and then a month- long service-learning trip with nearly 40 Wittenberg students and alumni. During my visits I was fortunate enough to meet several volunteers and learn about their projects. I also had the chance to better explain and promote the Tuition Assistant Program (TAP) as well as how FOL can support Peace Corps Volunteer (PCV) projects through Peace Corps Partnership Program (PCPP). I learned that although Peace Corps Lesotho (PCL) is still filled with acronyms, I felt my age as I did not know what some of them stood for. Perhaps the most interesting question I had from a volunteer was whether they thought that their access to cellphones and the internet made their experience less authentic than volunteers who served during the days of snail mail. I found it a very intriguing question, but not one I could readily answer. During my April visit I also had the opportunity to get a tour of the new PCL office. It is very impressive. Lastly, I had the opportunity to chat with current Country Director (CD) Leon Kayego about how to better connect in-country volunteers and FOL.

Thanks to the generous support from the American School in Taipei and other donors, FOL has already provided nearly \$10,000 worth of TAP scholarships in the first half of 2019. This will allow over 50 deserving Basotho youth to attend high school this year. The scholarship money was requested by 13 volunteers across several districts in Lesotho.

On a personal note, the other non-profit I am associated with, the Lesotho Nutrition Initiative (LNI) has shipped over 800,000 meals containing nutritional supplements. The project helps provide meals to over 3,500 children at 21 centers across the country (including 8 with PCVs) I am very pleased to announce that by working with PCVs, we have been able to expand our reach to four new centers. I am also delighted that two of my former students who travelled to Lesotho with me and served as student officers for LNI, Angela Galbraith and Justin Unternaher, will be part of next contingent of volunteers arriving in September.

I am pleased to report that our new free membership policy has led to an increase in FOL members, especially an increase in the number of Basotho living in Lesotho who have joined.

For those interested in learning more about the history of development in Lesotho, I would strongly encourage you to read RPCV John Aerni-Flessner's new book "Dreams for Lesotho." The book has drawn significant attention in Lesotho, so much so that King Letsie III requested that I bring him 10 copies.

Phelisanong Lesotho, southern Africa Orphans, Disabled, HIV/AIDS & Vulnerable Children's Project

THE FIRST QUARTERLY REPORT FOR 2019

CHILD CARE PROGRAM

Under this program, we have improved this year by adding more residences, and not the buildings, but we are still using the same buildings, as a result this has made children's living conditions better (in rooms) unlike in the past when they used small space, as you are aware that we have severely disabled kids, they need space so that they can interact with each other.

Secondly, the equipment in Physio has been increased again, by our partner Jen who has visited us from Wales. We have admitted new severely disabled kids this year. Jen is going to train more staff members on her visit on hygiene and feeding. She will as well train teachers and house mothers. She had in the past trained parents on how to take care of their kids whilst at home. She has also authorized parents to be borrow equipment so that kids can use at home.

Moreover, we are getting impressed that Phelisanong is becoming one of the best Centres with quality service in Physio Therapy because Jen has became an Ambassador of Phelisanong for Lesotho Children. Our main challenge is support funding, and for Phelisanong to have permanent Physio Therapists who are at least qualified with relevant degree or diploma so that the work is sustainable even when she is at home in Wales. She also needs financial support on materials to use after the trainings in hygiene for house mothers.

Child Care Program has also improved with the implementation of new system where new caretakers trained this year seem to be more co-operative because the children used to spend most of their time in houses but now they are taken out to play. Besides

menu at the kitchen has improved tremendously because most of the food being served was suggested from the training our matron has undergone. Phelisanong has employed a farm manager and that has changed our menu too because we have fresh vegetables from our own gardens and the poultry project is providing our children with eggs for better nutrition as well as providing money for day to day expenses. Besides general funding from R.C. GARNETT ELEMENTARY IN CANADA in the beginning of the year, we managed to buy toys, bikes and also gave a new look to our houses, which really have brought a positive change to lives of children who were lonely at the centre.

Moreover, Child Care Program wish to improve in many ways, by at least finding a Donor who can assist with salaries for a nurse or a doctor, who can visit the Centre on a weekly basis to assess the children, or a Funder who can build up a small clinic and buy medication and even employ qualified nurses to be at Phelisanong 24 hours a day, as we have multiple of disabilities and some of the children are living with HIV/AIDS virus, we also have children with Autism and Cerebral Palsy this year and they need medical attention. Finally Phelisanong Child Care Program is still in need of more volunteers who can train our staff members on the subject of helping severely disabled children (Celebral Palsy and Autism).

Phelisanong is willing to help a number children who are severely disabled, because Lesotho has a limited number of Centres like Phelisanong. We are really in need of support so that we can hire qualified personnel.

Education

Phelisanong has an integrated school, which provides educational facility for children from surrounding villages who are orphans and vulnerable. The school also provides for those children who needs special attention, therefore we have teachers who are qualified for the job though they are very few. We do not have a qualified Autism teacher. The school this year has improved a lot on the welfare of kids because there are lot of activities including sports going around. There is also a sign language teacher for the deaf. The centre is still in need of equipment in the special class.

The school is so grateful to world vision who have of donated toilets, hence improvement on hygiene.

Accounting

Phelisanong has few funders whom most of them are direct to their mandates only one funder so far has been general funder that makes hard for the centre in other problems to succeed, for example Phelisanong own fund of about R30,000 per month that goes to workers especially care workers and is not enough because you find that four care workers are taking care of seventeen children who are severely disabled that makes it hard to reach quality for the kids, unlike when most funders were general we could choose to provide more help. A large sum the care workers and other support staff are not on any funder's payroll which leaves us with a huge amount of money to pay for salaries. We usually try to pay these salaries from our income generating projects for eggs, animal rearing and the grinding mill but right now they contribute a little to the expenses such as salaries and other day to day expenses which are not funded because of their capacity. If we would increase the capacity of these projects it would greatly shoulder us where we have shortfalls. In an assessment report for Phelisanong done by the company VALE they pointed out that we have a high turnover of staff because of under paying our staff. The food costs have increased from last year and we are finding it hard to keep to the nutritious diet prescribed for our children, we find ourselves compromising to the situation by buying cheaper food that maybe of lesser quality for quantity.

Lesotho Cannabis Industry

In 2017, Lesotho became the first African country to legalise the growing of medical marijuana (cannabis) with high expectations for great economic benefits.

Speaking at a Cannabis Europa conference in London, Deputy Prime Minister Monyane Moleleki noted that Lesotho provides excellent conditions for the production of high quality medical cannabis.

Mr Moleleki said: "At a difficult time in southern Africa where economic growth is sluggish and climate change is causing hardship for the country, the emerging medical cannabis industry is a pragmatic and progressive solution to the challenges facing not only our own kingdom of Lesotho but in the region, the continent and the rest of the world." "Innovation in agriculture and manufacturing sectors is among key priorities for the government of Lesotho. The creation of jobs is critical to our goal of eliminating inequality and eradicating poverty," Mr Moleleki said. Loans secured for water and agricultural projects

Lesotho entered into loan agreements worth \$128 million with funds from the World Bank and the Government of Japan for a lowlands water project and an agricultural project in Maseru.

Part of the funding is for the second phase of Lesotho's Lowlands Water Development Project which is meant to improve living standards and address water challenges for domestic and industrial use in Maputsoe and Hlotse. Surrounding areas such as Ha-Setene, Sebothoane, Ha-Lesiamo, Khanyane, Tsikoane, St Monica's and Mpharane are also expected benefit from the project.

The project will construct a raw water intake on Hlotse River, construct a water treatment plant with the capacity of 25 million litres per day, construct a water pipe to transfer raw water to the treatment plant, construct a water transmission pipeline for treated water from Hlotse to Maputsoe, construct a water pumping station and a pipeline for pumping water into the water reservoirs in Maputsoe and Hlotse. The project will also construct the distribution network across Maputsoe and Hlotse.

Another portion of the funs is earmarked for the second phase of the Smallholder Agriculture Development Project (SADP II), which aims to improve and increase agricultural productivity in smallholder agriculture sector. The project is designed to help Lesotho increase the adoption of climate smart agricultural technologies and enhance the commercialisation of agriculture.

Anthrax

An anthrax outbreak was discovered in Lesotho on May 12, and thus far 24 cattle have dies. South Africa has banned the importation of live animals and related products from Lesotho. South Africa has offered to supply Lesotho with anthrax vaccine and personnel to help in administering the drug.

Anthrax is caused by a type of bacteria called bacillus anthracis which can be found in the soil and commonly affects domestic and wild animals around the world. Humans most commonly contract anthrax through contact with infected animals or animal products such as meat. The disease, which has been reported in Ha-Tseka, Ha-Au and Ha-Teko in Maseru, has also affected 24 people among them 11 children since it was first reported.

Lesotho Wool Centre (LWC) spokesperson, Manama Letsie, recently said they were stuck with M30 million worth of wool and mohair following the ban by South Africa.

Stock Theft

Villagers that are part of a Semonkong self-policing committee recently went to the Koebung area and seized more than 1000 sheep, 50 cattle and other domestic animals which they claimed were stolen by Qacha's Nek villagers from the Semonkong animal post in January this year.

Upon receiving reports of the incident the Lesotho Defence Force's (LDF) 11 Infantry Battalion recently confiscated 14 firearms from more than 300 Semonkong villagers who were on their way from recovering their stolen livestock in the Koebung area of Qacha's Nek.

The men reported that they just wanted to recover their animals that were stolen in January. The men from the villages were called for an emergency "peacemaking" meeting. Some animals were released to people who had documents that proved that they were *(Continued on page 7)*

indeed the rightful owners of the animals. The rest of the animals were taken to the Semonkong Police Station where their owners will identify them.

Stock theft is reportedly rampant in the area and the army has been inundated with calls to intervene. In the past three months the army seized about 2400 cattle. Many animals have been recovered in the Butha-Buthe and Qacha's Nek border areas.

In a recent interview the EU Ambassador to Lesotho, Christian Manahl, in response to a question regarding the dispute within the ABC party, the largest party in the governing coalition, noted that in order to implement any program you need a unified government, a unified coalition, which is capable to take courageous and important decisions. He said that internal power struggles impair this ability and he predicted that in the near future Lesotho will have another coalition government.

Interview with U.S. Ambassador to Lesotho

In a recent interview, United States Ambassador to Lesotho Rebecca Gonzales, discussed various U.S. efforts in Lesotho. As part of the interview, she said that the commitment of more than 2600 American Peace Corps volunteers is one of the greatest and most impactful areas of our relationship. "When I speak to Basotho, so many of them recount stories about Peace Corps volunteers who made a difference in their life – as a teacher, as a friend, as a community member."

She noted that Lesotho qualifies for a Second MCC Compact depending on Lesotho meeting the criteria which includes initiating and implementing governance processes designed to ensure the deepening of democracy in the country. Specifically, Lesotho must continue purposefully on the path of reforms and political stability to avoid disruption or delay to this process. Areas of concern are respect for the rule of law and for independent institutions of accountability, increasing corruption and ongoing reports of police brutality.

During the interview it was also noted that under AGOA, Lesotho remains the second-ranked exporter of textiles to the United States. The AGOA legislation is in place through 2025. There are 6400 other approved product lines under AGOA that Basotho businesses, from small to large, can take advantage of and export successfully to the United States. Lesotho has comparative advantage in a number of areas, including horticulture, aquaculture, and agro-processing. The country's high altitude, excellent soil quality, and abundant water support commercial agriculture – like fruits, vegetables, flowers, cereals, and trout. In mining, the country holds promising resources and can add value by exporting these minerals as finished goods as opposed to raw materials. Lesotho can also expand the scale of handicrafts export and diversify the already strong textile sector into higher-value goods and with higher value materials.

Lesotho, like all other AGOA-eligible countries, must adhere to certain eligibility requirements including governance benchmarks established by the US Congress in order to benefit from AGOA's trade benefits. Commitment to human rights and the rule of law and efforts to fight corruption are all key to economic development and key to stability.

Court indicates Prime Minster Thabane has no power to fire ABC members

During a recent hearing, a judge of the High Court remarked that Prime Minister Thomas Thabane, leader of the All Basotho Convention (ABC), has no right to expel members of his party without ratification by the party's national executive committee (NEC). The NEC is vested with powers to suspend or expel the leader. Pressure to oust Dr. Thabane from office has increased with recent remarks by the leader of the Movement for Economic Change stating that he would not use his party's six seats to save (Continued on page 8)

Thabane from a parliamentary no confidence vote.

The ruling was made in response to an urgent court application to, among other things, nullify Thabane's purported expulsion of several high ranking members of the party's new NEC elected at its February 2019 elective conference.

The fight for the control of the ABC escalated on June 17, 2019 when Thabane convened an open air press conference to announce the expulsion from the party of deputy leader Professor Nqosa Mahao, secretary general Lebohang Hlaele, chairperson Samuel Rapapa, and deputy spokesman 'Matebatso Doti. Despite the group having earlier won a court case that upheld their election.

PM urged to resign

Twenty All Basotho Convention (ABC) legislators including one Senator have urged their leader Thomas Thabane to resign as Prime Minister. The legislators also demanded that Thabane reinstate the "expelled" party's deputy leader, Professor Nqosa Mahao, secretary general Lebohang Hlaele, chairperson Samuel Rapapa and deputy spokesperson 'Matebatso Doti. The quartet was "expelled" for alleged insubordination stemming from its decision to continue holding countrywide rallies despite Dr Thabane's express orders not to do so.

Parliament was early this month adjourned indefinitely amid widespread speculation that this was done to stave off a vote of no confidence against Thabane by disgruntled members of his own ABC party and the opposition.

Selibe Mochoboroane, leader of the Movement for Economic Change (MEC) also indicated that it is time all political parties mobilised in parliament, in the courts and in the streets to push out the premier whom he said had clearly lost control of government.
