In Memoriam: Bill Savage

William "Bill" Savage Jr. died of cancer on August 31, 2019. He was 68. Bill was a gentle soul, passionate about teaching and volunteering to help young people. He served in the VISTA program for one year before becoming a Peace Corps Volunteer to Lesotho in 1978. He taught high school math at Sacred Heart High School in St. Monica, Lesotho. When he wasn't teaching or involved in school activities, he enjoyed having philosophical discussions or playing games over a glass of beer with friends.

After his return to the U.S., Bill helped open Gregory Middle School in Naperville, Illinois. There, he taught math to gifted students for over 25 years. Bill was also active in scouting, serving as a Boy Scout troop leader.

After Bill retired, he returned to Lesotho with his wife, Cindy, in 2017 to work as a volunteer for Laptops to Lesotho, a nonprofit helping educate primary school students in remote mountain areas. He worked at Kokobe Primary School for six weeks, teaching students math and critical thinking skills, as well as helping teachers improve their teaching skills. Bill was very grateful to have had the opportunity to return to Lesotho after so many years. He said living and working in a small village in the mountains gave him an opportunity to see a completely different side of Lesotho than he had previously experienced in the Lowlands at St. Monica.

Bill was highly dedicated to his family. He leaves behind his wife and four children, Will, Ted, Cara, and Peter. He will be sorely missed by the many friends he made and all the students he influenced.







In Memoriam: Sister Barbara Marie Andes



SNJM Albany, NY December 17, 1935—July 6, 2019 (Age 83)

Sister Barbara Marie Andes, a Sister of the Holy Names of Jesus and Mary for 63 years, died July 6, 2019, at the Provincial House of the Sisters of St. Joseph of Carondelet, Latham, NY. Sister Barbara embarked on the focal point of her ministry, beginning a 16-year career working as a missionary in Lesotho, Africa, where she served as teacher and principal in schools operated by the Sisters of the Holy Names. She also co-authored textbooks in agriculture and Bible Studies used in Lesotho secondary schools. Kevin Freer, RPCV-Lesotho, spoke to Sister Barbara's religious order, family, and friends at a recent memorial mass, recounting his experience working with Sister Barbara at the National Teacher Training College in the 1970s. How do these social media sites differ or complement the FOL website?



Leratong Community Center Updates

Schools reopened on the 29th of July. Class delayed by a teacher's strike is expected to resume after the 5th of August. The children will be back and classes will resume at the Center to help, especially in Maths and Sciences. Most of the children's results this session were poor. Retired teachers are being encouraged to help out. Five have agreed, to date.

Soccer and discipline

Some incidents left me with the last option of long-term suspension of players such as Kananelo Mashoai. 'M'e Joyce and Thabo Ntlhoki agreed to intervene. A 3-hour long discussion with the soccer players occurred in which grievances, respect, tolerance, theft and expectations or suspensions were set. We appreciate the support given to us and are hoping for some soccer balls. The cheapest are at USAVE at R60.

The Rice packets were delivered last week. Leratong was issued 90 boxes. This is what is being eaten by the children daily. No complaints as it is filling.

With the increase in wages, comes more expectations to get staff to perform better, punctuality, cleanliness of Center, volunteering to help with the sick, be it children or adults.

Progress report on Ntate Thakali and M'e Maleloko. Both started getting periodic rice packets after we were made aware of how sick they were. Their starting weights were 19 and 21kgs respectively. At present, they are at 54 and 58. Sometimes they are given support with the washing of clothes, with gloves. Every precaution for safety is taken. We meet during our lunch break so as not to compromise our responsibilities here.

A Pitso was held last Saturday to make the community aware that 6 Social work students have asked to start when NUL opens and to ask for their cooperation. I can only manage 3 successfully at a time.

The filling of the donga is complete, so collection of leaves will be replaced by another activity.

We are looking forward to warm weather.

Community Center August Report 2019

Attendance of the children fluctuated due to the weather. With the onset of the change of season, the numbers will be high.

Rachel came to meet us, but has not started her work with us. A lot is planned for her time with us.

Bonang Melao, 4th year Social Work student, has started his field work placement at Leratong. He will be supervised through literary classes, counseling (case work), community practice initiatives, group work, hospital referrals, and court attendance if necessary. At the moment, we are organizing help for a 5 yr old who is HIV positive with permission of his family.


Seedlings of tomato, green pepper, beetroot and radish have been planted. We hope for good weather.

The feeding scheme continues with no problems.

The lack of wool is an issue, but hopefully it will be sorted soon.

Both case studies of Maleloko and Thakali are progressing smoothly. Both were being supplied with rice to aid in their recovery.

DISCORD WITHIN ABC CONTINUES

The All Basotho Convention (ABC) held a special conference at which ABC leader Dr. Thomas Thabane was "suspended" for six years for alleged "uncomely behavior" and sowing divisions within the fractious ruling party.

Prof Mahao and four allies were elected into the party's NEC at the ABC's February 2019 elective conference in Maseru, but their victory was rejected by Dr. Thabane and his allies and has resulted in a power struggle for control of the party.

The special conference also nullified Dr. Thabane's June 17, 2019, expulsions of Prof Mahao and four of his allies, namely, Lebohang Hlaele (secretary general), Samuel Rapapa (chairperson), Montoeli Masoetsa (spokesperson) and his deputy, Matebatso Doti.

Seventy-four of the ABC's 80 constituencies attended the special conference along with the party's external provinces of Gauteng, North West and Free State. The Bobatsi, Semena, Khafung, Mokhotlong, Malimong and Qacha's Nek constituencies did not attend.

The vote in no way affects Dr. Thabane's status as Prime Minister - only legislators have the power to oust a Prime Minister through a "No Confidence" vote in parliament.

Parliament has been suspended, purportedly because the pro-Mahao ABC legislators filed a "No Confidence" motion against Dr. Thabane and, once parliament is re-opened, they will vote on the motion.

The power struggle between Thabane and Mahao has led to much litigation. Prof. Mahao and his allies challenged Dr. Thabane's June expulsion. The High Court temporarily nullified those expulsions and is expected to make a final ruling on September 30, 2019.

SPAT BETWEEN DEFENSE MINISTER AND ARMY BRASS

Army commander, Lieutenant General Mojalefa Letsoela, summoned all soldiers in Maseru to an urgent "Commander's Mass Parade" at Makoanyane Barracks to dispel unfounded rumors regarding efforts to make salaries of members of securities agencies consistent.

However, the army did not notify the Defense and National Security Minister, Tefo Mapesela. Many ministers were not pleased when they realized that their guards were withdrawn without prior notice.

The government recently embarked on an exercise to harmonize salaries to ensure that members of security agencies of comparable ranks earn similar salaries. While rank-and-file soldiers welcome the review, the army command has indicated it is not sure that it is the appropriate time to engage in such a salary review.

NUL FACING FUNDING CHALLENGES

The National University of Lesotho (NUL) is desperately short of funds after the government only provided M78 million when there was a projected need of M186 million for the 2019/20 financial year. NUL reportedly faces a shortfall of M108 million and is unable to attract and retain lecturers, staff, and students. Recently, there were violent student protests over delays in the disbursement of food and book allowances.

The shortfall has been attributed to the government reducing its support of higher education and political instability, which has resulted in deterioration of the university and government's relationship. In particular, there is reportedly a perception that the university serves as a center of political opposition to the ruling party.

THABANE AND METSING MEET

Prime Minister Thomas Thabane recently met with Lesotho Congress for Democracy (LCD) leader Mothetjoa Metsing. Reportedly, the meeting was an attempt by Dr. Thabane to thwart a "No Confidence" motion against him when parliament, currently on indefinite suspension, re-opens. If Dr. Thabane were to get Mr Metsing's support and all 11 LCD MPs vote against the "No Confidence" motion, the Prime Minister may survive by a two-vote margin.

DROUGHT WARNING

Lesotho is expected to have below normal rainfall from September through November 2019. Therefore, the Basotho have been asked to conserve water.

Lesotho had below normal rainfall in the 2018/19 rainy season due to an El-Niño induced drought and thus had a poor growing season which has resulted in up to 700,000 Basotho, about a third of the population, facing severe hunger.

Normal rains are expected from the end of November 2019 to March 2020.

Due to changing climatic condition, farmers are being urged to plant crops that will ripen faster given the shorter rainy season.

LESOTHO SERIALLY FAILS TO MEET 2003 AU QUOTE ON AGRICULTURE

Despite agreeing to commit a tenth of its annual budget to boost farming under a multi-lateral African Union deal geared towards ending hunger on the continent, Lesotho is lagging behind other countries in the region.

Amid perennial droughts, the African Union agreed in 2003 to improve food production on the continent. Member states agreed to set aside at least a tenth of national budgets and encourage people to take up farming under the Maputo Declaration on Agriculture and Food Security of 2003. The goal of the declaration was to eradicate hunger and reduce poverty by 2025.

Since Lesotho ratified the protocol, the country has failed to allocate sufficient funds to farming. From 2014 to 2019, Lesotho contribute an average of three percent of the national budget towards food production and farming development. Food production has been gradually declining yearly due to shrinking budgets and the effects of climate change.

POLIHALI DAM PROJECT DISPUTES

Clashes have erupted between Lesotho Highlands Development Authority (LHDA) contractors and directors of a mining company operating in the Khubelu and Senqu rivers confluence in Mokhotlong over resources and access issues around the Polihali Dam area.

The Khubelu and Senqu rivers fall into the priority area for the Polihali reservoir under Phase II of the Lesotho Highlands Water Project (LHWP).

Officials from Poone Diamonds are in dispute with LHDA's contractors over the latter's refusal to buy sand mined at the Polihali Dam site from Poone Diamonds as well as the use of an access road.

Poone Diamonds was awarded a 10-year license to mine diamonds and sand in the area even though construction work for LHWP phase II were already underway.

Recently, Poone Diamonds tried to use the LHDA access road to the river and access was denied. Poone Diamonds also reportedly wanted the LHDA to direct its contractors at the site to purchase the sand mined from them but the LHDA has refused. However, LHDA planned to mine their own sand from the same river and use it for their construction works.
